Bread-Knife Slayer Held for Murder



Neighbors had whispered of her husband's infidelity during her absence at a summer resort, so Mrs. Fannie Kirkwood, red-headed and 32, accused her husband, Glenn Kirkwood, six years her junior. He was a veterinarian and radio lecturer of Queens, Long Island. A bitter quarrel between the pair culminated in his mortal wounding. Mrs. Kirkwood is pictured here with police escort after telling a story of accidental killing. She said her husband received the fatal stab while attempting to prevent her from committing suicide with a bread knife. But Kirkwood had been slashed twelve times, one thrust entering his heart. His wife, charged with murder, was held in the same cell that had been occupied by Ruth Snyder, sash-weight killed.
