STABILIZATION OF TURKEY INDUSTRY

By organizing themselves into a cooperative marketing unit Douglas county turkey growers have wisely taken the most necessary step toward stabilization of their industry. Equal opportunity with other western localities for good profit margins and a barrier against serious market depressions, as long as there is coherence, are assured. No experiment has been launched so far as the plan itself is concerned, for other cooperatives have demonstrated its success and it remains only for Douglas county growers to profit by the example. In time state-wide and even interstate organization must eventuate because, as an Idaho turkey growing expert recently stated, rapid expansion of the industry demands the creation of new markets, promising good returns, and for the success of such a task the widest possible cooperation among growers is necessary. Another benefit of wide cooperation will be found in efforts to obtain better shipping accommodations and changes in legal and market regulations as they may become necessary from time to time. Success of the movement joined by Douglas county growers at Oakland this week to obtain a higher rate of tariff on turkeys imported to the United States will demonstrate the strength and effectiveness that lies in unity. It is noted, not without some regret, that no action was taken at Oakland on the recent suggestion of a Portland market expert that all first grade turkeys shipped from this county bear on the wings or legs a label or tag identifying the fowls as local product, thus carrying to the consumers information of origin to accompany the high reputation of Douglas county turkeys. This is a detail, however, that may receive favorable consideration later. It is sufficient and gratifying for the time being that an organization has been launched with the unmistakable stamp of permanency and important items that may have escaped attention in the beginning will in due time find their way into the marketing system.

What are the last moments of an unsuccessful ocean flight like? What is the nature of the final tragedy in mid-ocean darkness? A lot of us have tried to picture it, since the disappearance of Nungesser and Goll and others who were lost at sea. Now comes Commander Richard E. Byrd's book, "Skyward," to tell us. Byrd's plane, you remember, came down in the water off the French coast. If it had not been close to land Byrd and his three companions undoubtedly would have drowned. Byrd gives a graphic description of the crash. The plane hit the water with terrific force. He was dazed by the blow; a moment later he found himself swimming around in the water. Noble he discovered climbing out of a window of the sinking plane; Acosta and Balchen appeared a moment later, swimming near the wreckage. Fortunately, they were able to get ashore. But that account of the wreck gives us an understanding of what the last moments of other less fortunate aviators must have been like.

O. O. P. Leader Dies.
NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—George K. Morris of Amsterdam, chairman of the republican state committee, died suddenly today at the Hotel Drake of apoplexy.

Mr. Morris, who was a canned goods manufacturer, was born in Amsterdam in 1883. He had long been a member of the republican state committee and was its chairman for many years.

Daniels Not Alarmed.
ALBANY, Aug. 16.—Joseph Daniels, who supported the Glass dry plank at the Houston convention, declared before going into conference with Governor Smith late today that while there was some unrest in the south over the nomination of Smith, he was not alarmed.

Daniels expressed the opinion that Smith had not repudiated the party's platform in his message to the democratic convention, and predicted he would carry North Carolina by a tremendous majority. He said he would support the ticket "from constant to president."

"I think Smith will enforce the law," he said, adding that the people of his state were awaiting with interest the governor's acceptance speech.

Ballyhoo Via Movies.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Plans for showing Hoover campaign motion pictures in 20 towns a day from late this month until the election were announced today by the republican national committee.

Two motor buses, equipped with projection machines and screens in addition to loud speaking apparatus are being brought here from Greensboro, N. C., for inspection by committee officials this week.

One will be sent to West Branch, Iowa, for the homecoming ceremonies when Hoover visits there August 21. The other will be sent to Providence, R. I., Aug. 24, for the speech of Senator Curtis, his first after his acceptance address.

From these towns the buses will be sent on widespread itineraries under direction of the speaker's bureau at Minneapolis in head in Chicago, and Representative Tibbon of Connecticut is head in New York. Each bus, which will have a speakers' platform, is expected to visit 15 towns and will be manned by three or four men.

George C. Braden, Warren, and State Representative John T. Brown, Champaign county, author of the Ohio gasoline tax law, continued the same "neck-and-neck" battle that Cooper and Hoge carried on yesterday. Brown held a lead of 500 votes today.

Burton and Fess Lead
Congressman Theodore E. Burton, Cleveland republican, and Graham P. Hunt, Cincinnati attorney, democrat, were chosen to fight it out in November for the four-year unexpired term of the late Senator Frank B. Willis. Congressman Burton, who retired from the senate in 1915, without seeking re-election only to return to Washington as a member of the lower house, defeated later Justice Garrison T. Marshall of the Ohio supreme court with a plurality in excess of 110,000. Five candidates sought the republican nomination.

Senator Simon D. Fess, Yellow Springs, re-nominated on the republican ticket without opposition, will have as his opponent Charles V. Truax, state auditor of agriculture, who concentrated his campaign upon the farm relief issue and endorsement of the principles of the McNary-Haugen bill, appeared to have a plurality of more than 10,000 votes today over former Congressman George White, Marietta, who had the backing of the anti-saloon league.

Taft's Son Beaten
Among those who went down to defeat in Hamilton county was Charles P. Taft, H. son of Chief Justice William H. Taft, the citizens' republican committee candidate for re-nomination as county prosecutor. Prosecutor Taft lost to Nelson Schwab, the organization republican candidate, by 10,514 votes with one precinct missing.

Taft not only lost the nomination for county prosecutor but also was defeated for republican precinct committeeman in his home precinct.

POPE PIUS URGES RETURN TO PURE FEMINIST IDEALS

ROME, Aug. 16.—The Christian church has always recognized and encouraged the same ambitions of modern feminism, declared Pope Pius today, speaking to the Sacred Congregation of Rites.

History of feminine religious orders confirmed this, he said, since they are independent of Episcopal jurisdiction.

"If therefore today woman is going back to feminist ideals, turns her regard to the examples of the saints and to the teachings of the church she will find a just and holy response to her aspirations," said the pontiff.

The occasion was the solemn proclamation of virtues of the venerable Paola Frassinetti, who founded the Sisters of Saint Dorothy. The pontiff said that the newly proclaimed venerable had by her "generous consecration to God in the flower of her virgin purity," shown to the world of today, "the beauty of Christian modesty in a moment when it seems woman is doing everything in order to assimilate in herself everything characteristic which renders her more beautiful namely, purity, simplicity and modesty."

"This, he said, not only was true among persons belonging to the world for whom terrible things—Jesus was unwilling to pray, but also among many who do not wish to renounce the glory of the Christian name."

"This is blindness solely explainable by remembrance of what fascination is exercised by vanity of which the scriptures speak with such grave words," the pope continued, adding that modern feminism preached nothing beyond that woman should be sufficient to herself and render herself independent of suggestions and subjugation to men and open her own ways for herself.

"Very well, if all that this implies is the respect due all consciences and respect toward all divine and human laws, the church has always recognized and encouraged such feminism. The example of the venerable Frassinetti confirms it."

TRAPPER ACTS AS OWN SURGEON ON 4 FROZEN TOES

PRINCE GEORGE, B. C., Aug. 16. A trapper who amputated four of his toes with a kitchen knife when they became frozen last winter has arrived here for professional surgical attention but was told he had done the job so well no further treatment was needed.

While inspecting his trap line in the upper Finlay river, J. Omara suffered frost bite in his right foot. On returning to his cabin, which is 40 miles from the nearest neighbor, he noticed after a few days that infection had set in. A kitchen knife was the only surgical instrument available and it took Omara three days to perform the operation. He then washed the wounds in antiseptic and bound them up.
