U. S. LEADS WORLD USE OF TELEPHONE

There were 29,378,430 telephones in the entire world on January 1, 1927, of which more than 80 per cent, or 17,746,188 telephones were in the United States. In all of Europe there were 8,080,442 telephones, less than one-half the number in the United States and only 27.5 per cent of the total in the world. The remaining 12 per cent of the world's telephones were scattered widely over the globe in Asia, Africa, Oceania, South America and in those countries in North America outside the United States.

These figures have been taken from a recently published compilation of telephone and telegraph statistics, just received by J. R. Farrington, telephone manager. The time necessitated in obtaining authoritative data from the most distant countries has made it impossible to get strictly comparative figures for a later date than January 1, 1927.

Since that date, however, the number of telephones in the United States has passed the 18,300,000 mark, while the number in the world now is estimated at more than 31,000,000.

On January 1, 1927, date, the compilation revealed there were 15.3 telephones per 100 population in the United States as compared to only 1.4 telephones per 100 population in Europe. The only country approaching the United States in point of density was Canada, which on January 1, 1927, had 12.6 telephones per 100 population. China, for example had only 0.63 per 100 population.

Americans also use the telephone more often than the inhabitants of any other country, according to the statistics. There were 235 telephone conversations per capita in the country in 1924. Canada came next with 195 per capita; Germany reported 33 conversations per capita; Great Britain and northern Ireland but 27, and France, 17.

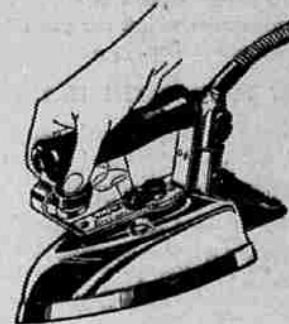
