Port Orford Scene of Joyous Occasion

Natives of That City Gather at Banquet Sponsored by Frank Tichenor—Many Old Timers Participate—Unique Menu and Table Decorations.

Port Orford, Curry county, Oregon, that little hamlet nestled on one of the best open harbors on the Pacific coast, where one's eye can view the great Pacific in all its splendor, dotted here and there with miniature mountains of solid rock, where a food of all kinds is so plentiful that it can be had for the asking, was the scene of a mighty joyous occasion Saturday night when upwards of fifty of the natives of that city gathered to participate in an old time banquet sponsored by Frank Tichenor, one of the boys who first opened his "peepers" in that neck of the woods some fifty or more years ago. The honored guests were those born at Port Orford forty-five or more years ago. The Western Cafe, cozy little eating place, was decorated with native shrubbery, the centerpiece being a large skunk cabbage. It was a real Indian muck-muck served in Indian style, with one of the most unique displays of cooked fish and tableware ever exhibited at Port Orford, or probably any other place. Not a single present day dish of any kind, no knives and forks or spoons, were in evidence, the shells from the deep sea providing all these "implements" for the guests assembled. Several beautiful Indian maidens in their native attire waited on the tables. The table cloth was made of a delicate section of sea moss, while the salt and pepper shakers were of whalebone. Knives and forks were fashioned from the side fins of the rat fish and mussel shells, highly polished, took the place of spoons. Souvenir toothpicks were made from the whalers of the sea lion, while pretty napkin rings had been taken from the backbone of the red fish, the napkins being of finely woven sea grass. Cups were fashioned from the heads of kelp, as well as souvenir plates. Dainty clam shells, with the guests' names neatly inscribed, were the place cards used for the occasion.

During the entire time given to the banquet—some three hours—a five-piece orchestra provided music, including in the program a number of dances executed by clever Indian maidens imported from the wilds of Curry county to live up to the program.

Menu Was Large and Varied. Here is what the natives had placed before them to satisfy the "inner man," prepared and served in a most delicious way: Grouper broil, red fish chowder served in the skull of the fish, roast ling cod, Indian weevil dressing, baked black bass with mussel sauce, steamed rock cod, fried kelp fish, fried sea trout, prepared fish roe, boiled wolf eel with rock oyster sauce, baked blueback salmon, steamed mussels, pickled mussels, rock oysters, cracked crab, clam pie, grouper cake, clam tale, roe butter.

The entire occasion proved most enjoyable to all present. It had been cleverly arranged and the gathering of former residents and those who have made their home at Port Orford continuously for over a half century spent many pleasant hours reminiscing of their early boy and girlhood.
