COAST GUARD AND FISHER DISPUTE OVER STRAY BOAT

(Associated Press Local Wire)
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 20.—A mysterious schooner, its sails in tatters, its cabin swept clean of charts and nautical papers, was being held by the coast guard today, its possession disputed by the captain of a fishing schooner who had discovered the derelict and taken it in tow.

The coast guard seized the boat because they believed it to be an abandoned run runner, and wished to explore its hold, which were blocked from immediate entry by a deck load of lumber.

The schooner, the John J. Marino of Baltimore, was discovered by Captain Francis Widerstrom of the fishing schooner Victoria of Anglesa, 18 miles off Cape Cod. Finding it deserted, Captain Widerstrom took it in tow and started for Anglesa. He was overtaken by a coast guard patrol boat which stopped him and insisted on searching the ship.

Their suspicions aroused by the manner in which the ship had been stripped of all papers and nautical instruments they cut the tow rope, when the fishing captain refused to yield possession and brought the schooner into port here. Captain Widerstrom and two members of his crew claiming the boat was their possession by law of salvage, refused to leave the schooner and were brought in aboard her.

A guard was placed over her pending search of the holds.

Informed that reports from Washington had carried the suggestion for an "old time inaugural" there for the next president, the nominee said there was plenty of time to talk about that.

"I believe that will get serious consideration some time around Lincoln's birthday," he replied, adding with a smile: "I wouldn't get flincky about that."

TEN MILLION GAME ANIMALS IN AFRICA BEGIN MIGRATION

NAIROBI KENYA, East Africa, Aug. 20.—A remarkable migration of game in the Tanganyika territory is reported by Garveth Wells of the Milwaukee museum, Chicago. The report being made from the party's first headquarters in the Tanganyika territory where they arrived on July 23.

Martin Johnson, noted animal photographer, who is in the same district with Wells, estimated that there are about ten million head of game migrating across the country in a solid mass ten miles wide and thirty miles long at one spot. Zebras were stated to be leading the way in a mass ten miles wide and five miles deep followed by miles of gnus and other animals.

The explorer's camp at the time reported was situated in longitude 36 east and about 2 degrees south of the equator. Wells reported that notwithstanding this equatorial location, the air was so cold he had to sleep in a sleeping bag and wear a thick overcoat and sweater while he would have been very glad for a hot water bottle at night.

The party had several exciting experiences with wild animals enroute, particularly with one group of eight lions which investigated the car in which Wells was riding, coming to within 15 yards of it and finally striking away.

Dr. S. A. Barrett, director of the Milwaukee museum, reported that the prospects of securing a fine collection of animals were excellent.

RECORD PEAR OUTPUT FOR SEVEN MARION CANNERIES

(Associated Press Local Wire)
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 21.—Some three thousand women here are undertaking the gigantic job of peeling 99,000,000 pears, the record job for this section, according to local fruit men. It is estimated 7,000 tons of pears will be packed in the seven canneries here this fall, all coming from southern Oregon, with the exception of an exceedingly small local crop. These pears, incidentally, will be cut into 195,000,000 halves and a good share of these halves cut into quarters, many pears being so large the halves cannot be shoved into the smaller sized cans. Each of the three thousand women will have some 30,000 pears to peel and halve, according to local statistic wizards.

given out by accident. That is not fair play.

Wet Vote Explained

Referring to the claim that he had voted at a church, one state school any place on Manhattan Island south of 39th street, he asserted this was unfair as the bill in question applied only to the Hotel Gotham which, while within 200 feet of a church, was permitted under court order to serve liquor to its guests by the device of renting a house outside the 200 foot limit, having a hotel employe purchase the liquor in this house and then carry it to the guests in the hotel itself.

"Fair minded men," he said, "were confronted with the decision as between a license for the sale within the premises of the hotel and the spectacle of bill-boys walking through the street with cocktail shakers and wine buckets in their hands."

"I chose in favor of the hypocrisy of such a procedure, and in view of the high character of the hotel, I was entirely satisfied that if liquor was to be consumed within the hotel it might just as well be sold in it."

Vice and Gambling

As to commercialized vice, the governor took up his vote against a bill introduced first in 1919 and which proposed to regulate the renting of rooms in hotels. This

HEALTH BULLETIN

Facts of Pasteurizing and Its Relation to Public Health
(County Health Department)

In this bulletin the facts are freely quoted from the United States Public Health Service Bulletin, Rosenman's Preventive Medicine and Hygiene, Lockett and Gray's Public Health, and the International Medical Digest after being translated into English.

Definition: Pasteurization is a process in which milk is heated to a temperature of 112-145 degrees Fahrenheit and held for 30 minutes followed by immediate chilling.

The boiling point of milk is slightly over 212 degrees Fahrenheit, so pasteurizing is not boiling or cooking of milk. Pasteurization definitely destroys the power of typhoid, scarlet fever, diptheria, tuberculosis, septic sore throat, undulant fever, and other disease producing germs while the harmless and more handy forms of bacteria continue to grow and multiply, so the milk curdles and sours as raw milk does, although more slowly. Because of the heating process of pasteurization the milk undergoes some other changes. The cream line is 1.8 inch less on a quart of milk because the fats are combined with the calcium and phosphorus more firmly and separate less readily. This combination of calcium and phosphorus is thought by some authors to delay bone formation in babies fed on pasteurized milk. Laboratory experiments and observations of babies, by the majority of writers, has not born out this premise.

Pasteurization, however, is the amount of vitamin C in milk. This is the vitamin which prevents scurvy and is present in quantity only during a small period of the year when the cows are eating fresh green things. Doctors, in feeding babies, do not depend on milk for this vitamin but prescribe the daily use of orange juice or tomato juice.

The flavor of the milk is not changed unless the cow's milk had a "sour" taste.

A word about some of the diseases known to be spread by raw milk.

Tuberculosis, which most often used to infect babies through milk, has been controlled by state law compelling tuberculin testing; and is very efficiently carried out by the county veterinarians.

fever and diphtheria, is ever present in raw milk from human carriers milking the cows.

Septic sore throat comes from infected udders and human carriers and undulant fever from the raw milk of cows infected with contagious abortion.

Undulant fever is an old disease known as "Malta fever" because of its prevalence in the Mediterranean countries, recently recognized in the U. S. and in Oregon.

Dr. De Kleins, conductor of the Marion County Health demonstration, predicts that it will soon be more of a problem in Oregon than typhoid. The prevalence of contagious abortion in the herds of this community is not definitely known but investigation by the county veterinarian, Dr. Nicholas, is being made now.

Bacillary dysentery, or "summer diarrhea," is responsible for the greatest number of deaths in babies under 1 year of age. This disease is always contracted through infected water or milk.

It is the babies who suffer most from infected milk and as they cannot vote someone must "go to bat" for them.

Pasteurization is not a substitute for conscientiousness of cleanliness, and should be supplemented by inspection. The U. S. E. H. Service in their campaign for an effective standard milk ordinance say first, "it must be designed to effect the maximum percentage of pasteurization which each city will support."

Properly pasteurized and bottled milk is safe milk.

Inspection as a substitute for pasteurization, because of the widespread number of cows from which the supply comes, would be just as practical as attempting to check up on all the fishermen and swimmers who get wet in the North Umpqua without a chlorination plant for our water supply.

IRELAND'S AUTO CLASSIC MARRED BY ACCIDENTS

BELFAST, Ireland, Aug. 18.—Kerue Don, noted British automobile racer won the Royal Automobile club's international tourist trophy car race over a 410-mile course here today.

BELFAST, Northern Ireland, Aug. 18.—A number of accidents and withdrawals marred the early stages of the tourist trophy automobile race which started this morning.

Captain Malcolm Campbell's blue Bugatt car burst into flames on the second lap but the captain, who was the favorite started in the race successfully in leaping out. His machine, was destroyed.

J. M. Anderson of the United States, had a slight crash half way round the track, but continued.

Baron D'Ermenor retired from the race with a disabled car; E. Machure, British entrant, skidded into a bank and withdrew; J. D. Barnes, another British entrant, crashed rounding a turn and was slightly injured, while J. Martin's French car overturned but the driver was not hurt.

R. C. Gallop of Great Britain was the leader at the half way mark, doing 265 miles in 2 hours, 30 minutes, 59 seconds.

The crowd which lined the 13-mile course was estimated at 250,000.

Viscount Curzon withdrew on the sixteenth lap because of a broken gasoline pipe. He was in third place at the time and appeared to have a good chance of winning.

SLEEPWALKING CHILD HAS THIRTY-FOOT FALL

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17.—A 36-foot fall from her second story bedroom window, where she climbed in her sleep, sent 12-year-old Catherine Haller to a hospital today with a badly fractured right shoulder.

Luckily, hospital aides said, the girl struck on soft ground, else she probably would have been killed.
