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SLASHING FIRE ON RICE HILL CAUSES MUCH EXCITEMENT

A big slashing fire on Rice Hill yesterday evening, resulted in considerable excitement in Roseburg and throughout the northern part of the county. The fire was set out under a permit on the Rice Hill place and burned over several hundred acres. The fire burned so rapidly and spread over so much territory that some of the neighboring residents became alarmed and telephoned to the Douglas Fire Patrol for aid. The fire also brought in word of the big fire, which was quite spectacular and plainly visible from the highway, so that a great deal of excitement was caused. H. O. Brown, supervising warden, sent out men to investigate the fire and later made a trip to the scene himself, but found that the fire had been controlled and was burning only on the lands of those who had secured permits to burn. The fire did considerable damage in destroying pasture, burning much faster than had been anticipated that the fire fighters were unable to save the pastures. In one place the fire ran through a pasture where Mr. Rice had about 300 sheep confined, but so far as could be learned none of the animals were killed. The fire kicked up a great cloud of smoke that was visible for many miles.

FUNERAL MR. FRIEND TO BE TOMORROW

The funeral services of Martin Luther Friend, for many years a

resident of Camas Valley, will be held at 11 o'clock Friday morning at the grave in the Murry cemetery in Camas Valley. Rev. F. E. Crook will officiate. M. E. Ritter, of the Roseburg Undertaking is in charge, and the funeral procession will leave the chapel at 9:30 a. m.

Mr. Friend was born in Iowa, November 4, 1851, and was 77 years of age. He crossed the plains with his parents in 1852 and settled in Suisun Valley, California. In 1855 they moved to Jackson Valley and after a few years they moved to Douglas county, settling here in 1861. He is survived by one brother, Z. T. Friend, residing in Eureka, California. W. R. Murray of this city is a grand nephew. Several distant relatives survive him.

SKELETON IS THAT OF YOUNG INDIAN, CORONER BELIEVES

Coroner M. E. Ritter returned last night from Reedsport where he spent yesterday investigating the finding of a skeleton at Nittcoos lake outlet. The skeleton, he believes, had been buried in the sand for 50 years or more and was uncovered by action of the wind in moving the sand. It was evidently the skeleton of a young man, and probably that of an Indian, this deduction being made because of the high cheek bones. The skeleton was so old that the bones crumbled at the touch. The bones were brought to Roseburg and will be interred in the county cemetery.
