FISTIC BATTLE PUTS ONE UNDER HOSPITAL CARE

cott's wife to come and get her husband. Talcott was found some time later by Mr. Dalley, proprietor of the Sugar Pine mill, who took the injured man to his home. Talcott was found unconscious in the center of the road, his face and head covered with dried blood and dirt ground into his face and eyes. How long he had been there has not yet been determined, but evidently it had been for more than half an hour.

Whether the road crew left him lying there or whether they left him sitting beside the road and he later stumbled out to the road and fell down is another matter that has not been established.

Claims Rocks Used—Talcott's recollections concerning the fight are very hazy, as he has been in a semi-conscious condition much of the time.

He says that he came to the place in the road where the work was being done and found himself unable to get by with his truck. He said that he got out to remonstrate with the road foreman, George Barter, and that while he was talking to Barter that Dyer "batted in."

"I told him to shut his mouth, that I was talking to the boss," Talcott said, "but he told me to take my glasses off, and came at me ready to fight."

Talcott said that as he clinched with Dyer he looked out of the corner of his eye and saw Dyer's father, Mr. Dyer, picking up rocks. He said that he ordered the elder Dyer to drop the rocks and that he remembers nothing more as he was knocked out by a blow on the head.

Injuries Not From Fists—The injuries sustained by Talcott were not made by fists, in the opinion of Dr. George E. Houck, who was called to attend the injured man.

"Talcott is suffering from a fracture of the upper jaw," Dr. Houck says, "and I doubt if a man could hit hard enough with his fist to cause such an injury. His face is also badly cut and bruised as if he had been struck several times with a rock, or else kicked in the face. He has apparently been struck a number of very hard blows as his face is terribly swollen and cut, while the fractured jaw indicates a blow heavier than the ordinary man could hit with a fist."

The injured man is in the hospital, and will probably be required to remain there for two or three weeks, the physician says, although the injuries are not necessarily of a fatal nature.

Making Investigation—Deputy Sheriff McCabe spent several hours yesterday questioning members of the road crew who witnessed the fight, and also talked with Talcott at the hospital. District Attorney Gordon questioned Dyer, and today Sheriff Webb and other members of his force are continuing the investigation.

It is rumored that there has been bad blood between the men for some time and that they have had previous trouble, although they have never before come to blows.

Some of Talcott's friends have also made the claim that other members of the road crew "ganged" on Talcott and that he was attacked by several of the men instead of by Dyer alone, but this is denied, and as yet the
