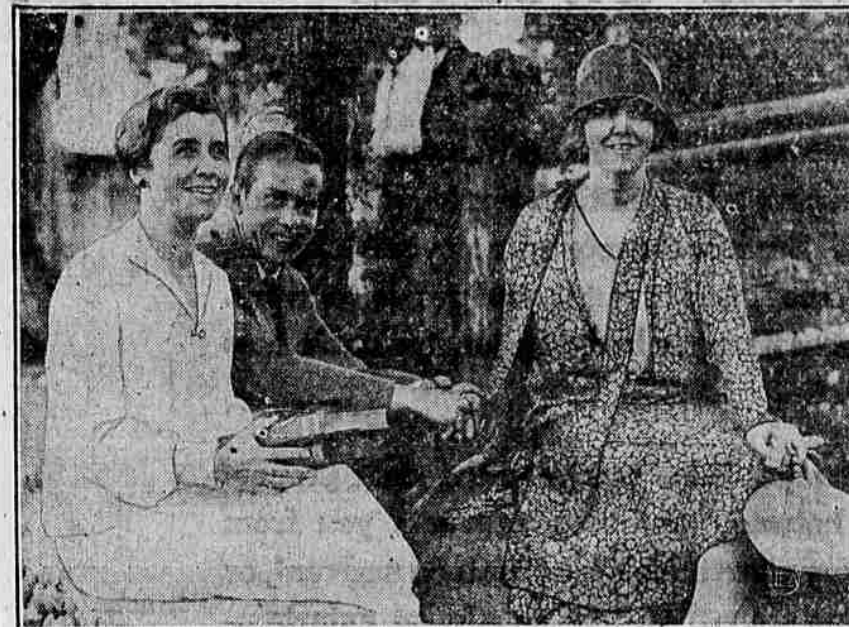


HOOVER AND COOLIDGE

BIGAMY CHARGE FOLLOWS WEDDING OF FILM ACTRESS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 24.—A scarcely welcome wedding present has been offered Jacqueline Logan, film star, by the Los Angeles county district attorney's office.

Hardly had the news of Miss Logan's marriage in Tijuana, Lower California, to Harry Winston, Los Angeles broker, been received in Los Angeles yesterday when Forest Murray, chief deputy district attorney, declared the actress might face charges of bigamy as a result. She obtained an interlocutory decree of divorce from Ralph Gillespie here last March.

Murray said, which does not become final until March, 1929. "If Miss Logan and Mr. Winston return to Los Angeles county to reside as man and wife, the district attorney's office will be duty bound to take action against Miss Logan," he declared.

The authorities cited the case of the late Rudolph Valentino, film actor who married Natacha Rambova in 1922 at Mexicali, Lower California, only five months after obtaining an interlocutory decree of divorce from his first wife, Joan Acker. Valentino was arrested on a charge of bigamy. When he and Miss Rambova separated after a honeymoon at Palm Springs, the charges were dropped. They were married a second time in Indiana several months later.

EAGLES LODGE WORKING FOR OLD AGE PENSION BILL

Wednesday evening the Fraternal Order of Eagles held an especially interesting meeting in their lodge rooms to hear D. D. Hall, an attorney from Portland, who is chairman of the Old Age Pension committee for Oregon and also deputy grand worthy president of the F. O. E.

Mr. Hall's talk was for the purpose of explaining the Old Age Pension movement in Oregon which is being fostered by the F. O. E.

Among other things, Mr. Hall said:

"If the people of Oregon were at all familiar with the conditions that exist in the Poor Farms in this state, in common with all other states, they would insist upon the Old Age Pension becoming a part of our system."

"I am not a radical in any sense of the word, but I am radically opposed to the present method of caring for our indigent old people. Our present plan is expensive, obsolete and conducive of discontent and unhappiness among the inmates of these institutions."

"Old age pensions are by no means an experiment. As far back as 1889 Denmark adopted this method of caring for its indigent old and has never gone back to the barbaric method of the poor farm. Then followed Germany, France, England, Hungary and in time every first and second class nation in the world with the exception of the United States, China and India."

"The Fraternal Order of Eagles in 1922 at their national convention actively began a campaign for old age pensions in America which has resulted in the passage of this law in Kentucky, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Maryland, Colorado, Nevada, Montana and Alaska."

"British Columbia then swung into line and so successful was the law there that it has recently become national in Canada, the Dominion paying a portion and each province paying the remainder of the pension."

"It is a significant fact that no country which has ever adopted old age pensions has ever reverted to the barbaric method of the poor farm."

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ASHLAND AROUSED BY MISINFORMATION ABOUT HIGHWAY

H. L. Claycomb, Fred Taylor, Lew Hanson and E. G. Harlan, active workers in the Ashland Chamber of Commerce, came to Roseburg yesterday as an official delegation to confer with the Roseburg Chamber concerning methods of securing and disseminating correct information regarding the Pacific highway.

It is claimed that certain travel bureaus and railroad agencies in Portland and other points

have been discouraging tourists, particularly in the winter time, from making the trip, over the Pacific highway, claiming that road conditions into California are too bad, and advising the tourists to ship their cars by rail or boat to San Francisco or other California points.

It is the desire of the Ashland chamber to organize a group to provide correct information concerning road conditions and combat the effort to draw traffic away from the highway. The Siskiyou mountains, it is pointed out, are constantly patrolled during the winter months, and are kept open

at all times, so that the highway is always passable.

The Chamber of Commerce secretaries of the state are to meet in Roseburg in September, and at that time the matter will be taken up more thoroughly, and hotel, service station and campground managers will be invited to be present to participate in the hearing.
