DENIES GUILT IN OREGON CASE BUT LIKES MARTYRDOM

(Associated Press Special Wire)

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 27.—Mother Superior Concepcion Acobedea de la Lina, under custody since the assassination of General Obregon in July, denied categorically all the charges made against her in an interview Saturday with the correspondent for the Associated Press in the jail at Mexico, near Mexico City, where she is being held.

Mother Concepcion, in this first interview, with foreign correspondents, not only asserted her own innocence of connection with President-elect Obregon's assassination, alleged plots to poison or otherwise kill President Calles and General Obregon or her knowledge of the manufacture of bombs, but also declared that neither the Catholic church nor the clergy were responsible for any of these. She added: "However, it is my ideal of life to be a martyr. To be a martyr one must be punished for a crime one has not committed. I wish to be a martyr. Therefore I accept punishment and suffering."

Later, in '58, they came to Rogue River valley, and in '61 moved to Camas Valley, where he made his home until a short time prior to his death which took place at Roseburg Wednesday, August 22, 1928.

He leaves behind one brother, Z. T. Friend, of Eureka, California, one aunt, Mrs. Davis, of Roseburg, an aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Murray, also of Roseburg, and a host of loving friends. His life was one of kindness and thoughtfulness of his neighbor and fellow man. He was converted in a revival some few years ago, and leaves a testimony of the saving grace of God. He died at the age of 76 years, 11 months and 18 days.

Interment was in the Murray family cemetery of Camas Valley. Rev. F. E. Crook of the Bible Standard temple officiated. M. E. Ritter had charge of arrangements.

SLAIN MAN'S ESTATE VALUED AT \$20,000

PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—D. Dewey, 60, who was shot and killed August 1 by Rex Mead, 15, while seated at the dinner table in his farm home near Rockwood,

left an estate embracing real and personal property valued at \$20,000, according to a petition for probate of will filed with Circuit Judge Tagwell. Anna Dewey, 55, the widow, who was willed the bulk of the estate, was named executrix. In his will Dewey bequeathed \$500 to James A. Dewey of Glendale, Ore., brother, and the residue to the widow. Mead is now held in the juvenile ward of the county jail on a first degree murder charge.

OREGON'S INSANE AND CRIMINALS TO NEED MORE ROOM

(Associated Press Special Wire)

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 25.—If the population of the state penitentiary continues during the next two years to increase as it has the last two years, declares Secretary of State Kizer, additional facilities to care for the prisoners must be provided.

Kizer said it would not be long until more room also is needed to care for the inmates of the insane hospitals at Salem and Pendleton. In the last year the increase at the penitentiary has been 112 and at the insane hospital 121.

At the nine state institutions caring for state wards the population on July 31 was 1964 as against 1747 on the same date last year. With the completion of the state tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles, which will be early next year, the state will have facilities to care for a waiting list of from 60 to 75 now existing because of limited facilities at the tuberculosis hospital in Salem.

MINIMUM RATE ON GAS USED FOR HEATING REDUCED

Authority to reduce the heating and industrial gas rate from \$6.00 minimum to \$2.50 minimum was received Saturday morning by M. R. Brown manager of the local office. Gas is being used more and more for heating purposes, and is found to be very satisfactory. Hereafter, however, the minimum rate, it was felt by many, was too high to permit gas being used for heating or industrial purposes where only a small quantity was necessary. The reduction of the minimum rate from \$6.00 to \$2.50 it is anticipated will encourage the use of gas heating.
