U. S. WILL BE IN RED IN 1929 FIRST TIME SINCE WAR

(Associated Press Special Wire)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—President Coolidge's hope for a balanced budget on June 30, 1929, apparently faces disappointment, and the government, for the first time since the war, formally is forecasting a deficit in the treasury.

As set forth in the annual report of Director Lord of the budget, the figure on the red letter side of the ledger is expected to be \$34,273,346 for the fiscal year 1929. The reason for the deficit, which, if materialized, will displace a once-expected surplus of more than \$252,000,000 are given by government estimators as greater outlays of money due to expanded activities of bureaus, and a prospective decrease in revenue.

The trend toward fulfillment of one side of the situation—decrease in revenue—was attested to last night in a report of the internal revenue bureau, made public at the same time Director Lord predicted the deficit. This report disclosed that tax collections in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1928, were less by \$75,147,592 than in the preceding year.

CHINESE FAMINE TAKING THOUSANDS

(Associated Press Special Wire)
—SHANGHAI, Aug. 27.—Ten per cent of the inhabitants of a famine district 30 miles wide and 100 miles long in northeast Shantung are in an advanced stage of malnutrition and apparently doomed to death, said Karl Baker of New York, who returned here today from an inspection of the district.

Another 25 per cent, he said, is "slowly starving." Grasshoppers and drought cut the spring crops in half while the autumn crop is described as "practically a complete failure." The district contains about 1,500,000 inhabitants.

Mr. Baker said his investigations convinced him that there is need for immediate relief.

ST. HELENS, Ore., Aug. 25.—Police officers today redoubled their search for Carl Shelton and Taylor White, young negroes, following the discovery yesterday in Milton creek, near here, of the mutilated body of M. C. Ramsey, 62, negro foreman of the Tom Johnson ranch on which the three were employed.

STEAMER RAMS AND SINKS TUG; FIREMAN MISSING

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The passenger steamer Chester W. Chapin of the New England Steamship Co., rammied and sank a tug today in Hell Gate off Ditmars Dove, Astoria. A fireman on the tug was reported missing. The other ten of the tug crew were rescued.

A 15-foot hole was torn above the water line on the starboard side of the steamer bound from Providence with 250 passengers. After the collision the steamer swung into a reef where she lay for nearly an hour before being pulled off by tugs.

The accident was believed due to a misunderstanding of signals.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 27.—Consolidation of the membership of all evangelical Lutheran synods in the United States, comprising

about 350,000 members, was approved today by the evangelical Lutheran joint synod of Ohio and other states in convention here.

The Ohio joint synod will merge with the Iowa and Buffalo synods, which have themselves approved the merger. The merged body will be called the Evangelical Lutheran synod of America and will control some \$10,000,000 in property.

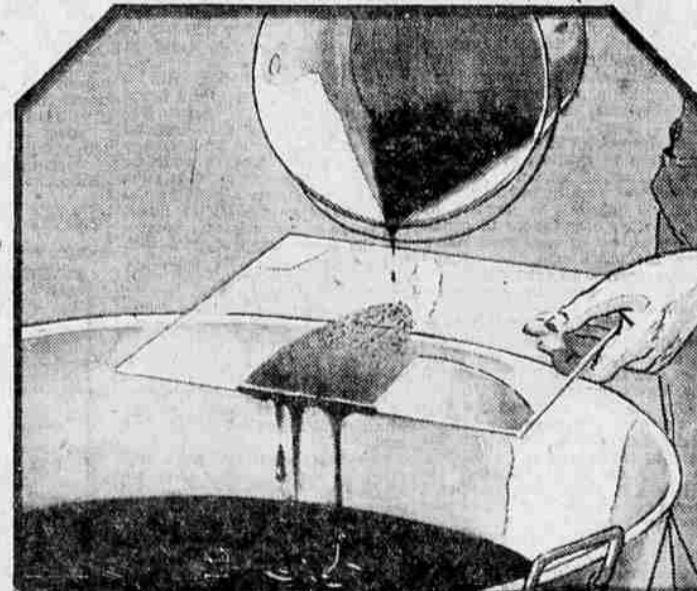

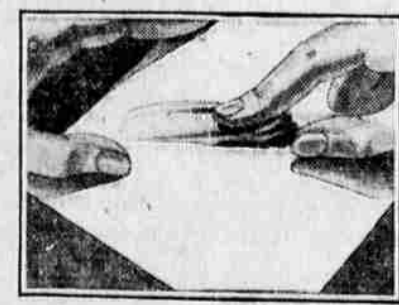
