PIONEERS' PICNIC STAGED FOR SEPT. 2 ON CALAPOOIA

All old timers and pioneers, as well as those who arrived in Oregon at a later date, are expected to meet at the Scott Heagy school house on the Calapooya, September 2, and enjoy an old time pioneer's picnic. There is no Douglas county pioneer association, but considerable talk has been indulged in looking to the organization of such an association at this pioneer picnic Sunday, September 2, so those people of the county who have spent a life time in this section of the state are expected to be on hand that day to take part in the program.

Some of the pioneers of the county are out boosting for this picnic, and wherever they go are busy telling about the good times planned for the occasion. The first gun of the program will be fired at 10:30 on that particular September morning. Frank Grubb, of Wilbur, is billed to sing at that hour, and then there will be an address of welcome by another old timer, The Sutherland orchestra has been engaged to play during the day. Of course there will be the informal reunions of pioneer day friends, and at noon the ladies will spread lunch. Tables will be provided for use of the diners, but if any one wants to sit in family groups and enjoy their lunch with friends, there will be shady nooks for them. Everybody is expected to provide lunches, but coffee will be obtainable on the grounds. Just take your container along and the official coffee dispenser will fill it for you.

The committee in charge of the arrangements, while urging pioneers to attend, want it understood that the younger generations, including the babies, are invited. In fact, they feel that the whole affair would be a dismal failure without the youngsters. Then they want every recent arrival in the county to be on hand to get acquainted and learn first hand how cordial an Oregon pioneer really is. Old time hospitality will prevail. If anyone wants to come in an airplane, the committee states there is a good landing field adjoining the picnic grounds. But the keynote is "Come—even if walking is necessary."
