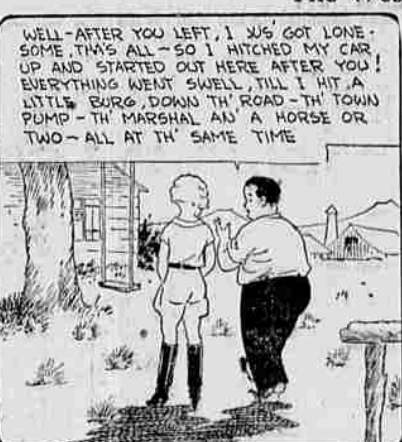
### MOVED TO NEW QUARTERS
