old fifth ward who came to welcome him back to his native city. Turning to the nine New Jersey state police who accompanied his party on motorcycles all the way up from Spring Lake, the governor voiced his thanks to which they joined in reply.

"Pleased to have met you, Mr. President."

New Jersey Held Safe.

As a result of the big send-off Governor Smith today was more convinced than ever that New Jersey was safe for him in November. After the rally at Sea Girt, he told newspapermen that that demonstration, while of course appreciated, was not needed by him because, in his opinion, New Jersey was not debatable territory in this campaign. Mayor Hague, Senator Edwards, of that state, Governor Moore, and William L. Dill, democratic candidate for governor, echoed the governor's views and predicted their party would carry the state by 200,000.

Wet Issue in Idaho

GRANGEVILLE, Ida., Aug. 28.—The country has had nine years of nullification of the prohibition law and is prepared for sensible modification, George Donert, Weiser attorney, declared in his keynote address at the opening session of the democratic state convention today following his election as temporary chairman.

Donert boldly buried the prohibition question into the convention. Most of the delegates had come pledged to uphold the democratic national platform which contains a dry plank.

"There is no beating around the bush," Donert declared. "We have had nine years of nullification and there is no relief in sign."

Donert said there must be modification of the Volstead act to permit sale of light wines and beer. As for "dry" planks in the platform of the major political parties, Donert branded the inclusion as "the most damnable hypocrisy ever written into a political document."

"Seventy-five per cent of the delegates to each national convention violated the Volstead act in the 24 hours preceding the adoption of the dry plank," he declared.

Donert voiced approval of the national ticket, making special reference to Governor Smith, the presidential candidate.

REX MEAD FACES FIRST DEGREE MURDER CHARGE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28.—Rex Mead, 15, who confessed to shooting and killing his employer, E. D. Dewey, on August 1, was yesterday charged with first degree murder upon the recommendation of the county grand jury. The youth fled to southern Oregon and was captured at Redport a few days after the killing.

Mickey Walker Makes Successful Debut Into Light Heavy Class By First K. O. Ever Handed Emanuel



SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—The middleweight champion went hunting for barstools in the light heavyweight division and got what he wanted because that tremendous thud and thump heard last night in Recreation park was Armand Emanuel (lower) hitting the canvas for the full count.

With the same spectacular attack that helped him win and hold the welterweight and middleweight titles in turn, Mickey Walker punched Emanuel out of the 175 pound class, temporarily at least. He dropped the San Francisco boy in the seventh round of their ten round battle.

It was the first knockout ever chalked up against the 22-year-old lawyer-boxer and his second defeat in more than thirty fights. A few months ago he gave Tommy Loughran a great battle, losing a close decision.

Jack Kearns, manager of Walker, announced that he was negotiating for a title match with Loughran. He said it would be held either in Chicago or Los Angeles.

CHANGES TRAIN SCHEDULE TO BE EFFECTIVE SUNDAY

Several changes in train schedule are to be made effective next Sunday on the S. P. line, speeding up train service between Portland and San Francisco. The chief change is in No. 12, the northbound Shasta, which arrives one hour later in Roseburg. Other trains are changed only slightly.

Some adjustments are also being made in the motor coach schedule to conform to the train time. The new schedule is as follows:

No. 41, southbound Shasta, arrives here 2 p. m. and leaves 2:10 p. m. Leaves Portland 8 a. m., arrives in San Francisco 10:30 p. m. No. 12, northbound Shasta, arrives here 6:05 a. m.; leaves 6:20 a. m. Leaves Portland 10:45 p. m., arrives San Francisco 7:30 a. m. No. 12, northbound Shasta, leaves San Francisco 8:30 p. m., arrives Roseburg 4:30 p. m., leaves 4:40 p. m., arrives Portland 10:30 p. m.

Stage leaves Marshfield 10:20 a. m., connects with No. 11 at Roseburg; stays till 4:40 p. m., and connects with No. 12, arriving in Marshfield at 8:05 p. m.

No. 13 connects at Grants Pass with motor coach, leaving there at 10:20 a. m., arriving at Eureka at 7 p. m., connecting with North-west Pacific train at 8 p. m. for San Francisco.

Stage from Eureka leaves there 8:45 a. m. and connects with No. 14 at Grants Pass.
