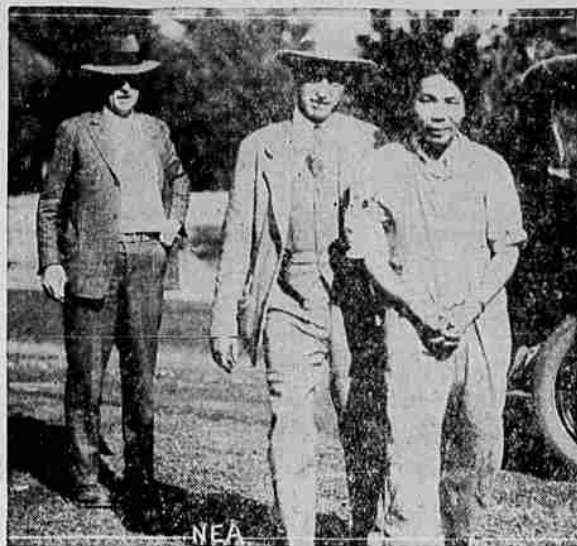

FIRST ISSUE OF
NEW STYLE LEGION
PAPER IS PRINTED

The first issue of the Pacific
Legion, the official publication of
the Oregon department of the
American Legion, in its new form
was printed last night and is being
mailed to the veterans of the state.
Henceforth the publication has ap-
peared in magazine form, but at
the recent state convention it was
decided to change to newspaper
style and the contract for the
printing was awarded to the News-
Review company.

Nearly all of the state depart-
ment publications are now in
newspaper form, this style being
found more readable than the
magazine style previously used.
The current issue of the Pacific
Legion is full of interesting re-
ports of the recent state convention
at Medford, and of the doings
of the organization in various
parts of the state. The publication
in its new form makes a very
"snappy" appearance and is ex-
pected to prove much more popu-
lar with the veterans.

The printing is done exclusively
by the News-Review company and
represents a large and important
contract. The News-Review com-
pany was selected to do this work
largely because of the high stand-
ard maintained in its printed work
together with the fact that the
equipment provided in the job and
newspaper departments makes
this plant one of the few in the
state, outside of Portland, capable
of handling a contract of such
size.

RUSSIAN PRESS DERIDES
BRIAND-KELLOGG TREATY

(Associated Press Special Wire)

MOSCOW, Aug. 28.—The Rus-
sian press shows very little en-
thusiasm over the Kellogg-Briand
renunciation of war treaty, both
Izvestia and Pravda, leading official
papers, being decidedly cold in
their editorial comment.

Meanwhile the soviet govern-
ment intends to make a careful
study of all documents relating to
the pact before making any decision
as to whether it will accept the
invitation to adhere to it extend-
ed through the French govern-
ment.

Pravda says that while a great
part of the bourgeois press abroad
is praising the "universality of
the pact it is simultaneously giv-
ing in its hands over the fact
that the pact does not obligate any-
body to do anything."

Izvestia says that as long as na-
tions keep arming, the pact can-
not be anything but a dead letter.
The Russian position, it adds, is
that full and lasting peace can
only come after complete universal
disarmament.

**FIRES AGAIN
SET IN SOUTH
MYRTLE AREA**

(Continued from page 1)

night, the fires being started about 10 or 10:20 o'clock and being spread over considerable area. They were set out about a quarter of a mile from the road and almost in a direct line. They were quickly discovered and a prompt report sent in making it possible to get fire fighters at the scene quickly. A fairly large group of men had been kept available in this district, while a crew of 18 more fire fighters was rushed out from Roseburg. Other crews were organized and held in readiness at Oakland and Hoagland, but reports this morning were to the effect that the fires were apparently being controlled and that no more men would be needed.

Arrest Expected

Anticipating another attempt to fire the South Myrtle creek district, Harvey Brown, supervising warden for the Douglas Fire Patrol, has had guards stationed at various points in that section, which action was responsible for the prompt reports received on the fires. The guards are believed to have obtained sufficient evidence to enable them to establish the identity of the person guilty of starting these fires and their information is being presented today before District Attorney Cordón so that it is very probable that an arrest will follow immediately.

Mr. Brown declined to state the nature of the evidence obtained until after the officers had had a chance to make further investigations and to obtain additional information, but stated that he is confident it will be possible to locate the person responsible for the fires and that his guilt can be proven.

Many Attempts Made

The forest protection agencies have long been troubled by incendiaries in the South Myrtle creek district. It is a section widely used for stock grazing, and is inhabited largely by settlers who have been located in that section for many years, and who believe that the forests should be burned over at frequent intervals to provide suitable range. Some of these are so determined in these opinions that they have deliberately fired the county year after year in spite of the heavy penalties attending apprehension, and have so far been successful in eluding capture.

The fire patrol and the forest service, whose lines join on the Dr. Howard, Ned Dixon's Super upper reaches of the stream, have Station. Ned Dixon, Hugh Whip made every effort to protect the

county, which carries a very valuable stand of timber, but each year sees a renewal of the efforts to burn over the area. A great portion of the timber, particularly around the Weaver creek section, is privately owned and is used as free range by the stockmen.

Incendiarism Costly

The worst fire to occur in that district was in 1925 when incendiaries were responsible for a fire that swept over 6,500 acres, destroying a great deal of very valuable timber land. Hundreds of fire fighters were necessary to halt the flames, while the work of control cost the county over eight thousand dollars and resulted in more than \$50,000 worth of timber lands being stricken from the tax roll. During that fire there was a great deal of friction between the fire fighting forces and the residents, one clash even resulting in a fist fight.

There is throughout the entire county a constant warfare between certain stockmen and the forest protection groups. Several efforts have been made this year to burn over timber land in the Hinkle creek district on the Calapooia, and several fires were set out in that district Sunday but were quickly controlled. There have also been fires set out each year around Elkton.

Another string of incendiary fires was set out last night along the inland creek ridge in the Cow creek canyon. The fire reached 100 acres in size, running through an old burn and causing but little damage. It was reported to be under control today.
