ROBINSON STRESSES DRY ISSUE, FARM RELIEF, CORRUPTION

itself to "rescue" the government from those who have betrayed their trust by disgracing it."

Recapitulating the events of the last eight years, the senator contended the record disclosed that the republican party "has admitted the urgent character of the agricultural problem."

"The facts prove also that the republican party," he continued, "is either incapable of successfully dealing with the question or has deliberately violated its express promises to the farmers of the nation."

"It would seem that eight years have afforded ample time for action and that a political organization which has had every opportunity which the years could bring to obtain beneficial results should not now be heard to ask for a renewal of its lease on power merely to repeat the old promises which have been so often broken."

Farm Relief Views
Mr. Robinson, a supporter of the McNary-Haugen bill said that Mr. Hoover's present position "touching upon legislation for agricultural relief marks no material advance," and that the republican nominee in his acceptance speech recognized the "persistence of the (farm) problem and what is more significant the failure of his party to advance a constructive program of relief."

The senator reviewed Mr. Hoover's remarks on the farm question and declared that the democrats repudiated his proposal "to limit farm production to domestic demands as calculated to belittle rather than to encourage the great industry of agriculture."

"The democratic party recognizes the right of farmers," the senator went on, "to lead in the development of farm policies. While the equalization fee provided for in the McNary-Haugen bill is not expressly approved, the democratic platform does recognize the principle of distributing the cost of operations with re-

spect to surplus crops over the marketed units whose producers are benefited thereby.

"If a more equitable and effective plan than that comprised by the equalization fee is discovered it should be adopted. The time has come, however, when an economic adventure is justified in behalf of the millions who engage in that industry without which civilization could not survive."

"The democratic nominee for president has committed himself to prompt and decisive action in accordance with the principles outlined in our platform."

G. O. P., Frauds Cited
Among other things, during the course of his speech, the senator said that the "wholesale frauds perpetrated by republican office holders since March 4, 1921," had prompted the republican national convention to place in its platform a plank declaring in favor of honesty in government.

He also declared that throughout the Harding-Coolidge administrations the prohibition bureau had been under the treasury department, "whose head, prior to national prohibition was largely interested in the liquor business."

"Mr. Vane (William S. Vane of Pennsylvania) who thwarted the movement to 'Stop Hoover' at Kansas City and forced Mr. Hoover's nomination," he added, "claimed election to the senate on a platform containing a single plank—the repeal of national prohibition."

were lost in the search for Italia disaster survivors.

The cablegram was sent by Froelich Froelich, head of the Oslo newspaper, relief expedition for Amundsen. He said the report came from Hurd and that he was investigating.

"The message indicates the plane fell in the open sea," said Prentice, who was chairman of the American advisory committee of the unsuccessful Amundsen-Ellsworth polar flight of 1926 and the transpolar flight of 1926.

Amundsen and his party disappeared in June while flying across the Arctic region to join the forces at Kings Bay searching for General Noble and his men of the Italian polar dirigible.

Two Bodies Found
PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Aug. 30.—Search for the giant British Columbia Airways monoplane which fell into the Strait of Juan de Fuca near here Saturday went forward with renewed vigor today following the recovery of the bodies of two of its seven passengers.

Entangled in wreckage from the plane, the broken bodies of Mrs. Alexander MacCallum, Scott of London and Floyd Soverel of East Orange, N. J., were washed up on the beach of Discovery bay yesterday. Mrs. Scott was the only woman aboard the plane on which her husband, a former member of parliament, was also a passenger.

George W. Vest, government aircraft inspector for the aeronautics branch of the department of commerce, began an investigation of the disaster yesterday. Arrangements had been made for an aerial survey to locate the sunken trimotored plane.

Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30.—Peaches held the center of the stage on the local wholesale fruit and vegetable markets here today with prices on canning varieties easy and movement fairly heavy.

Prices today ranged from 65c to 75c per box for Elbertas and Muirs for canning purposes while large, select table peaches brought about 15c per box more. J. H. Hales topped the market in the table varieties around \$1.00 @ \$1.15 per box.

There was a healthy condition in the apple division today with receipts nominal and supplies rather tight for this season of the year. Demand was fairly good and prices averaged around \$1.25 @ \$1.40 for desirable sizes of Jumble packed stock. Packed Gravensteins went well at \$2.00 @ 2.25 while cooking apples and faced and filler offerings sold from \$1.00 @ \$1.25 per box.

Crops of apples in orchards adjacent to Portland are not as large as usual, it is reported, many orchards having practically nothing to market.

Pears were in liberal supply and sold at \$1.50 @ \$2.00 per box packed and as low as \$1.00 loose.

Onion prices were firm but a shade easier than last week denoting the commencement of the season for Oregon Yellow Danvers. Walla Walla Yellow Globes went in at \$2.00. What Oregon onions there were available brought about the same price.

Local dry pack lettuce sold at \$1.25 @ \$1.50 per crate. Cabbage receipts were light and the price firm at 3c per pound.
