KELLOGG GIVEN
GREAT WELCOME
ON DUBLIN VISIT

Populace Cheers American
Official From Time He
Lands to Entry at
the Capitol.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Aug. 29.—All classes in the Irish Free State joined in a hearty welcome which was given to Secretary of States joined in a hearty welcome day for his Irish visit fresh from the memorable signing at Paris of the Kellogg-Brand renunciation of war pact.

The enthusiasm broke loose from the moment that the cruiser Detroit, bearing Secretary Kellogg and his party, steamed into Kings-town harbor. A great crowd which had been gathered on the sea front at Dunlaoghaire for hours cheered the arrival of the cruiser while a salute of eighteen guns of the Free State army which had been mounted for the occasion boomed out.

When the cruiser was first sighted, a small boat containing Vice President Byrd and members of the cabinet accompanied by Frederick A. Sterling, American minister, Mrs. Sterling, and Washington Abbott, secretary of the American legation sailed out to meet her. The platoon brought back M. and Mrs. Kellogg and President Cosgrave who had accompanied them from Paris.

All Classes Welcome
The American secretary of state and the Free State president landed to the alternate strains of the national anthems of the United States and the Sacraist played by an army band within a square formed by the military guard of honor, drawn up at the point of disembarkation. The reception committee included men of all occupations and parties, Captain Nutting, governor of the Bank of Ireland, and the heads of the chamber of commerce represented the business interests while the heads of two universities represented the educational world. The local townships representative presented an address of cordial welcome at the royal Irish yacht club.

The seven-mile route to the city was gaily beflagged. The city was reached at the Baggott street bridge where there was a brief halt. Trumpets sounded and a mounted escort clattered up and the procession then continued to the mansion house for presentation of the freedom of the city to Secretary Kellogg. The secretary signed the roll of Dublin's freemen and a scroll of citizenship was presented to him in a silver box.

YANKS CONTINUE
HARD PRESSED IN
AMERICAN LEAGUE

Athletics Less Than Three
Games Behind Leaders;
St. Louis Ahead of
National Pack.

The Athletics' petatist at their task of blasting away the remnants of that Yankee lead, once so handsome, but National League contenders are coming upon rocky paths. The rampant Macken found themselves only two and one half games behind the idle Yankees, while the Cardinals, rained out in Chicago, heard tidings of defeat for two of their challengers—the Pirates and the Giants.

The men of McKeechid led by a best five and one half games over Chicago as they moved into Pittsburgh today for the start of a crucial series of which the national league will see many in the coming fortnight if not the next four weeks. The Pirate threat at this moment is the most serious the Cardinals face. They must put it down by at least the odd game in seven to be played in the next two weeks, or face the threat of disaster.

In American league engagements, the Browns made it four straight over the Red Sox, winning by 4 to 3, and the Indians slammed the ambitious Tigers, 9 to 5. George Burns got two homers, and Marty McManis one.

Don Cantwell, traded to Boston in the Cleveland deal, came back to the Polo grounds to lead other former Giants in making it three straight over the home boys, 8 to 3. The slant McGraw won home run honors on circuit drives by Lindstrom and Jackson, but was in the race for the decision at no time after the third round which witnessed a brutal assault upon Vic Aldridge and Fred Fitzsimmons for five runs.

The defeat was the seventh straight for the Giants, and their ninth in their last ten games. It dropped them a fraction of a point behind the Cubs who moved up into second place by a half a game without playing. The slant McGraw, too, is in a virtual tie with the Reds, also idle yesterday.

Even though shut-out by the Phillies by 4 to 0 at Pittsburgh yesterday, the Pirates are only half a game behind the Giants and the Reds, one full contest worse than the Cubs, and six and one-half to the rear of the Cards. If the seven imminent Pittsburgh-St. Louis games are important to the Cards, they are vital to the Buccaneers. The Cards need four out of seven, the Pirate crew must clean up almost all of them to get anywhere.

ANDREWS' FOSSILS
MAY BE FORCED TO
REMAIN IN CHINA

PEKING, China, Aug. 30.—An attempt to prevent Roy Chapman Andrews from taking out of China the 85 crates of fossils which he brought back from the Gobi desert, has been made by the Chinese historical preservation commission. This body has been joined in its protest by the Peking political commission.

The historical commission telegraphed to the national government at Nanking urging that curators of the character unearthed by the Andrews expedition should remain in China.

The political commission, in backing up the historical body, made the claim that Mr. Andrews had explored for oil deposits as well as for fossils.

If the protests are upheld at Nanking, the American Museum of Natural History in New York will miss having in its collection fossil remains of what the explorers declared was the largest beast known to science, in defeating the finding of this particular fragment of other days, members of the expedition said that they could not bring out all of the relics of the animal because of their size. They plan, therefore, to return to the desert next year. Among other relics left in the clay bed where the giant fossil was discovered, was a pelvis-bone which was said to be as large as a base-drum.

The expedition personnel is now in Shanghai classifying the material which was transportable and preparing it for shipment to the United States.

MEDFORD BOY, 17,
GETS 5-YEAR TERM

FRENCH AVIATOR
GETS U. S. CROSS

tempt to link Paris with New York by air, today received the American Congressional Distinguished Flying Cross, one of the highest distinctions awarded by the United States government.
