DUNDEE, WELTER KING, KNOCKED OUT BY FRISCO NEGRO

CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—The closest approach to the immortal Joe Gans flashed menacingly over the pugilistic horizon today.

The new star is young Jack Thompson, sleek looking young San Francisco negro, who last night caused a startling upset by knocking out Joe Dundee of Baltimore, the world's welterweight champion, in the second round of their scheduled ten round battle in the White Sox park. Thompson is the welterweight titleholder in fact if not officially only because of a weight technicality.

The only reason Thompson is not proclaimed champion today was because Dundee forced him to weigh 145 pounds, one pound over the welter weight limit.

The San Francisco negro proved that he is fast and clever as was Gans and that he can punch like the famous lightweight king of two decades ago. He revealed these sterling qualities when he knocked Dundee down twice in the second round and stood there waiting to deliver the finishing punch when referee Eddie Purdy mercifully stopped between them and stopped the uneven battle.

Young Thompson comes from fighting stock. His father, who used to be a fighter and trained with Gans among others, taught young Jack a lot of his ring craft he picked up from the "Old Master" of the ring.

WELL KNOWN BROCKWAY MAN DIES WHILE ON VISIT

James Michael Troutman Simmons, resident of Douglas county for many years, died Sunday at Fossil, Oregon, and funeral services were held the following Tuesday, burial being in the Mayville cemetery. Mr. Simmons was the nephew of Michael T. Simmons, who came to Oregon over the plains with Col. Cornelius Gilliam, and who established the first sawmill in the northwest.

He was born in Missouri 70 years ago and came to Oregon in the early '70s, settling in Coos county, later moving to Douglas county, where he lived most of his life. In the late '80s he went to the eastern part of the state and then to Washington. Of late years he has been residing near the Brockway post office and while visiting relatives at Fossil was stricken with paralysis and died after a week's illness. Surviving him are two sisters, Mrs. Sarah Catching of Pendleton, Mrs. Mahala McCarty of Pomeroy, Wash., and a brother, W. D. Simmons of Beuna Vista, Oregon.

JAMES G. COLE TO BE BURIED IN EAST

The body of James G. Cole, world war veteran and well known Legionnaire of Douglas county, who died while in the veterans' hospital in Portland this week, is being sent today to Tidewater, Penn., where interment will take place.

Mr. Cole was born September 12, 1880, and was nearly 48 years old. His birthplace was Wattsburg, Penn., and he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Cole, now deceased. He came west in April of the year 1906 and first lived at Myrtle Creek, staying there for a year. He lived in various places in the county for many years and had been working at Klamath Falls when he became ill and came home last Friday. He was taken to the veterans' hospital in Portland, where he died yesterday from intestinal influenza and pneumonia. Mr. Cole was a world war veteran, enlisting at Camp Lewis. He was unmarried and leaves four brothers, one, George E. Cole of Myrtle Creek, and three brothers in Pennsylvania, also three sisters.
