

WOMAN POISONER OF 3 SUSPECTED OF MORE VICTIMS

TUNSON, Mo., Aug. 30.—Sheriff Arthur Gorg has been asked to question Mrs. Bertha Gifford, confessed poisoner of three persons, in connection with the death of Elizabeth Brinley, three year old daughter of Mrs. Eva Ramsey, of East St. Louis, Ill. Six other deaths of persons in Mrs. Gifford's home also were being investigated.

The child died after being nursed by Mrs. Gifford, Mrs. Ramsey said in a letter to the sheriff. The father of the child is Caswell Brinley, a cousin of Ed Brinley, 48 a farmer, who died in acute pain the night of May 16 1927. In the home of Mrs. Gifford, after Mrs. Ramsey as she has admitted, gave him poison with medicine. Mrs. Gifford, now in the Franklin county jail has confessed poisoning Ed Brinley, and two sons of a hired man, George Schamel. The circumstances surrounding six other sudden deaths of persons she attended when they were ill were under investigation before Mrs. Ramsey reported a tenth case for inquiry. Mrs. Gifford said she administered the poison in an effort to "relieve stomach pains" in her patients.

FLOOR POLISH EXPLODES, SENDING 3 TO HOSPITAL

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 31.—Three men were in a hospital here today, seriously injured as the result of a fire that followed an explosion at 1 a. m. today in the Portland recreation building. The men were polishing a floor when sparks from the electric polishing machine ignited the polishing compound. The men inhaled fumes and received serious head burns. They were Claude Silvernail, Jack Thatcher and W. O. Myers. A fourth man, O. E. Evans, was less seriously injured. Damage to the building was estimated at \$1,500.

STEAMER GROUNDS OFF BRITISH COLUMBIA COAST

SEATTLE, Aug. 31.—The steamer Redwood of the Pacific American Fisheries, bound from southeastern Alaska to Bellingham, Wash., grounded on a reef in Queen Charlotte Sound, off the coast of British Columbia, early today. The vessel, which was returning with a few passengers and a heavy cargo of canned salmon, was reported in no immediate danger.

However, life boats were held in readiness to abandon the ship if necessary. The steamer grounded in a dense fog.

COMPARISON OF HERB AND AL

Both Like Baseball and Radio, Starched Collars, Cigars and White Shirts.

Herbert Hoover and Alfred E. Smith have a number of things in common. Each is 54 years old. Both were born in poor and humble surroundings, both lost their fathers during boyhood, both have blue eyes, both are family men with children, both are loved by their professional associates. Hoover's intimates call him "Chief"; Smith's know him as "Al".

Both are radio and baseball fans. Each wears a large collar and comparatively low shoes. Each—despite the legend of Smith's brown derby and the fact that neither would ever be taken for Beau Brummel—is particular about his personal appearance. Their clothes are always pressed, and someone sees to it that their hats, suits, shirts and ties match in harmonious colors.

Both wear starched white collars, except in the case of Smith for sport dress. Hoover's collars are notoriously high; Smith's are always low. Both wear plain white soft shirts. Smith likes striped ties, bow or four-in-hand, and Hoover wears rather quiet four-in-hands of gray, brown or blue.

Hoover worked his way through Leland Stanford. Smith worked while attending parochial school. Each is of a religious faith never before represented in the White House. For further particulars read these tables:

REGISTRATION OF VOTERS UNDER WAY AT CLERK'S OFFICE

The books at the county clerk's office for the registration of voters are now open, and voters who are not properly registered and prepared to vote at the coming November election should attend to the matter of registration immediately. It is no longer possible to be sworn in on election day, as the "Blank A" system was done away with at the last general election. It is now necessary, therefore, for a voter to be properly registered, or he cannot vote. Any person voting for the first time, or who has never before been registered, or those who have allowed their registration to lapse because they have not voted for a period of three years, should register immediately. It is also necessary to change registration after moving from one voting precinct to another.
