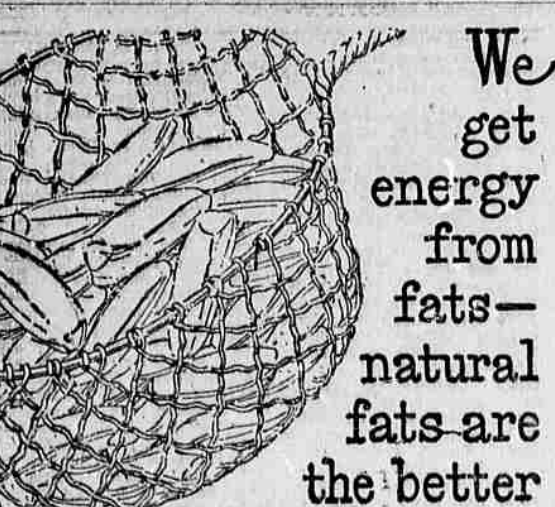

1 cup flour
2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1/2 cup milk or water
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
Beat eggs well with milk, add sifted dry ingredients and beat until smooth. Use this batter for dipping sliced apples (with or without skins), whole small bananas, small peeled oranges or thick, drained slices of larger oranges, sliced pineapple or quartered fresh pears; slide quickly into hot lard (375 to 375° F.) and cook until fruit is soft. Drain and serve sprinkled with powdered sugar. Grape, loganberry or currant jelly is especially delicious with banana or apple fritters.

WOMAN ALLEGING SHE WAS JILTED DEMANDS \$700,000

(Associated Press Special Wire)
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 6.—Suits for \$700,000 have been instituted here by Miss Alice G. Porter of West Medford, a Radcliffe graduate, against the estate of Allan A. Hooker of Wellefleet, who amassed a fortune in the small loan business in Boston before state legislation curbed high interest rates.
The woman, who for 14 years acted, she says, as a confidential adviser to the small loan broker, charges that Hooker failed to keep an often reiterated promise to marry her and that the administrator of the estate has refused to pay her a promissory note for \$100,000 which, she claims Hooker gave her in return for companionship and advice. The note was payable at his death.
Miss Porter, who was a first cousin of Hooker and a former high school teacher, says she became engaged to marry him in 1914. In 1916, she avers, he agreed to give her his entire estate. He died in 1927.
It was only then, she asserts, that she discovered Hooker had married Miss Margaret E. Mahoney of Arlington, a divorcee and, at the time, Hooker's secretary.
