ATHLETICS MANAGE TO CAPTURE GAME FROM THE YANKS

Fourth Contest of Series
Won by Bishop's Home
Run—St. Louis
Lead Grows.

Thanks to Max Bishop, the Philadelphia Athletics have been saved from utter rout in the now famous battle of the Bronx.

After smashing the A's into defeat in the first three skirmishes of the crucial general engagement, Miller Huggins' Yankee brigade ran afoul of Bishop's ninth-inning home run in the fourth clash yesterday. That dramatic blow carried with it a 4 to 3 victory for the Macmen and enabled them to beat a dignified if somewhat hasty retreat from the Yankee stadium.

The Yankees thus saw their American league lead clipped to a game and a half, a margin the Athletics hope will prove not impossible to overcome when the two clubs invade the west on Saturday for the closing games of the season. The Yanks have 15 games and the A's 13 west of the Alleghenies.

A crowd of 40,383 saw the end of the series, swelling the total attendance for the four games to 177,113.

Cards Increase Lead

While the New York Giants and the Chicago Cubs were idle, the St. Louis Cardinals stretched their National league lead to three games by defeating Cincinnati, 2 to 1, in the last home game of the season at St. Louis. The Cardinals got only five hits off Donohue and Kolp but bunched two of them with a walk, a balk and a stolen base to tally twice in the fourth. The Reds scored their run off Grover Cleveland Alexander in the first inning by means of a walk, a single and a sacrifice but "old Pete" was invincible thereafter.

In the only other National league engagement of the day, the Brooklyn Dodgers beat the Phillies, 6 to 1. William Watson Clark, dodger southpaw, scored his second victory over the Phils in three days, giving them only five hits. The Robins banged three Phil pitchers for 17 hits, four of them going to Babe Herman.
