**KOZER WILL RESIGN
ON SEPTEMBER 24**

 SALEM, Ore., Sept. 12.—Sam A. Kozar said today that he will relinquish the office of secretary of state on Monday, Sept. 24. He will be succeeded on the same date by Hal E. Hoss. Kozar resigns to become state budget director, an office created by the 1927 legislature. Hoss is the republican nominee for secretary of state in the November election. The governor's appointment of Hoss to fill the unexpired term has not yet been announced, but is expected in a few days.

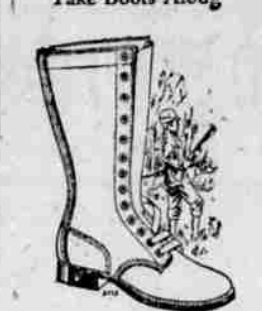

ambassador to Peru, lost in the republican primary by a heavy vote to Kenneth Macintosh, former state supreme court justice. Four other congressional candidates, besides the chairman of the house immigration committee—three republicans and one democrat—had no trouble in overcoming opposition.

Governor Roland H. Hartley was re-nominated but his own slate of candidates for state administrative posts was shattered. N. D. Showalter, former state normal school head, was the lone survivor, defeating Mrs. Josephine Cordias Preston, state superintendent of public instruction for 16 years. Scott Ballitt, as colorful a campaigner as the governor, received the democratic gubernatorial nomination.

Hartley Keeps Control
 Proponents of the governor in the state legislature were more successful than Hartley's administrative candidates, displacing veterans in both the house and senate, particularly in southern Washington. The changes, political observers said, would give the governor's forces undisputed control of the house of representatives and strengthen their hold in the senate. The majority of the republican legislative nominees are unopposed.

KLAMATH FALLS MAN WINS LEGAL FIGHT WITH DRYS

 PORTLAND, Sept. 12.—The case against D. W. Burling, 36, of Klamath Falls, was dismissed in federal court here today although no provision was made for his broken nose, suffered when two prohibition agents attempted to search him. The search, the court held, was illegal.

Burling was leaving his apartment house on August 24 when officers Terry Talant and Earl Koehler accosted him and told him they wanted to search him. Court records failed to show a probable cause upon which the search was based and the case was dismissed on that ground.

When told to submit to the search, Burling struck at one of the men, talant, and started to run. The two overhauled him and, according to his testimony given at a hearing, beat him into submission, breaking his nose.

Although five photos of liquor were found on his person, the search was held illegal and Judge Dean today dismissed the case upon recommendation of Francis E. Marsh, deputy United States attorney.

ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOLS EXPECTED LARGER THIS YEAR

Registration in the two high schools of the city indicates that there is to be a considerable increase in school attendance this year. Preliminary slipup of students is far above any previous year, and, as a great many prospective pupils are away on vacations or are employed that they cannot get away during the day time during the registration period, it is expected that those not registered will bring the total attendance to more than last year.

The senior high school has already booked 241 pupils, while the junior high school has listed 262. In each school the number registered is just 31 below the total attendance for the opening day of school last year. In the senior high school, however, only 92 boys, out of a total of 241 pupils have been listed, and it is estimated that there are at least 40 more boys yet to be signed up in that school.

All of the teachers for the coming year are expected to arrive Friday. A meeting is being arranged for Friday afternoon at which time the teaching forces will be organized and the plans discussed for opening schools Monday. It is hoped to have the week as outlined that there will be no confusion or disorder on the opening day.

\$60,000-RANSOM ASKED BY YOUTH'S CAPTORS

 CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—Frank Gahner, a sewer contractor, notified police last night that his 16-year-old son had been kidnapped and was being held for \$60,000 ransom. The kidnappers have notified him, he said, that the boy will be put to death if the money is not paid by Saturday.

Police were told a week ago that the Gahner boy was missing. Gahner said he had not mentioned the kidnapping then because he feared to do so. What finally prompted him to lay the case before the police, he said, was that he has six other children, for whose safety he fears.
