

### CHIEFTAIN MINE AT MYRTLE CREEK TO BE DEVELOPED

#### Expert Mining Man Acquires Control of Property Abandoned Twenty-Five Years Ago.

Immediate development of The Chieftain Mine on South Myrtle creek is planned by Edward Law, experienced mining engineer, who recently moved to this county to reside. Mr. and Mrs. Law were in Roseburg today attending to business matters connected with testing the development work under way. Mrs. Law was formerly Florence Grandy, and served as county health nurse for more than a year.

Mr. Law, who is a graduate of Toronto University school of mines, and who has been engaged in mining in various parts of the west for the past 15 years, recently negotiated a lease on The Chieftain Mine, which for the past 25 years has been abandoned, after having been operated as one of the most successful properties in northern Oregon for several years.

This mine was a very rich producer, but the main vein apparently "pinched out," shortly after the company had spent a great deal of money for machinery and equipment, and work was halted, the property later being abandoned. Mr. Law began an investigation of the mine and states that he has located the continuation of the main vein, which shows assorted values that can be handled very profitably. He says that he has definitely proven that the vein he has located is the continuation of the one that was previously operated with profit to the owners, and is convinced that the mine can again be restored as a very rich proposition.

He is now preparing to erect a residence, tool shed, shop and other necessary buildings and will immediately start the task of clearing out the tunnel and shaft, and rebuilding the timbers, during the winter he plans to put in necessary equipment for handling the ore and will ship to the smelter for extracting the metal. Later he plans to put in a complete mill on the property.

### CANNERY MAKING RECORD RUN ON PRUNES THIS YEAR

The local cannery is still continuing its run on prunes despite the fact that the original quota of 39 cars has been surpassed and 40 cars have now been loaded. The plant was closed down at noon yesterday as the workers caught up with the supply and it became necessary to get in more fruit before work could be continued. Two shifts have been working for the past week, and in many instances the workers remained on for part of both shifts in order to keep up with the run of the fruit. Two shifts will be continued as long as fruit is available. Mr. Norton states that the plant will probably turn out 50 carloads of prunes. He had 29 carloads already sold before the run was started and expects that the rest will be quickly disposed of, as the product has met a ready sale on the market and is becoming widely known. Work on apples will be commenced within a few days.

### EMPIRE CITY TAKES ON NEW LIFE; OLD CHARTER JUNKED

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 20.—One of the oldest city charters in the state was discarded yesterday when residents of Empire City voted 51 to 19 to adopt a new code. The older charter, adopted half a century ago in 1878, had never been amended.

When Empire citizens saw an awakening of the city a few months ago attorneys employed to draw a new charter found only one time-worn copy of the original. To allow for development of the city and give the council power to make improvements, levying cost to property owners was the principal purpose in adopting the new charter.

By adoption of the new document the board of aldermen becomes the city council. Empire City was once the largest town in southeastern Oregon, being the stopping place for stage on the old coast line between Crescent City and the Umpqua river. It was for many years county seat of Coos county, but for the past twenty years has fallen into decay.

### ABDUCTED UNION MAN FEARED SLAIN

(Associated Press Licensed Wire) DETROIT, Sept. 21.—Fear that Max Ruben, secretary of the motion picture operators' union of Detroit, was slain by labor racketeers who abducted him from his office yesterday has been expressed by police.

Ruben was kidnaped by eight armed men while a score of office attacks were held at bay with pistols. The labor leader reported to police last week that he feared he was to be "taken for a ride," but was unable to furnish authorities with the identity of his alleged persecutors.

Police said Ruben had been actively engaged in a factional fight within the union, in which a private detective agency was involved. Members of the agency were called in for questioning and three suspects held.

### GIANTS AND CARDS TAKE GAME APiece IN DOUBLEHEADER

#### Crucial Duel Featured by Homers; Yankees' Lead Over Mackinn Cut to One Game.

(Associated Press Sports Writer) The Yankees, losing a 12-inning battle to the Chicago White Sox yesterday, saw the Philadelphia Athletics creep to within one game of the lead again.

Meanwhile the National league remained unchanged as the Cardinals and the Giants tangled in a double bill and emerged with one victory apiece as home runs flew thick and fast at the polo grounds. What advantage there was went to St. Louis for he got rid of two more games from his schedule without losing any ground to his chief rival.

Home Runs Thick  
Pitchers got none of the glory at the polo grounds. George Harper, who once patrolled right field for McGraw, took lumps in his own hands in the first game, crashing out three home runs, and the Cardinals coasted to an 8 to 5 victory.

The boys calmed down a bit in the second game until the eighth inning when the Giants, fighting to overcome a two run lead, sailed into old "Pete" Alexander for five runs, four of them on Hogan's second home run of the day—a mammoth drive into the left field bleachers. That left the score 7 to 4 and there it remained.

Despite the even split, the Giants were heavy losers. They were presented with a wonderful opportunity to tie for the lead and ended exactly where they started—two games out of first place. They meet the Cards again tomorrow and for the last time on September 30.

In the other National league games, the Pittsburgh Pirates trounced the Phillies 6 to 4, while the Cincinnati Reds were splitting evenly in two games with the Boston Braves. The Reds won the first game 7 to 2 but went down in the nightcap, 9 to 5, when the Braves scored eight runs in the first inning.

Faber Halts Yanks  
Urban Faber was the master of the situation at Chicago where the Yankee ship struck a reef and went down with all hands aboard. The veteran spitballer held the champions to eight hits in 12 innings and walked off with a 2 to 0 decision.

Before the Yankees finally had gone down at Chicago, the Athletics, thanks to Jack Quinn, had turned back Detroit, 6 to 1. The Tigers got only six hits off Quinn and would have suffered a shut-out but for a fumble by Jimmy Dykes.

The St. Louis Browns clinched third place in the standings by defeating the Boston Red Sox, 5 to 2. Alvin Crowder pitched his 15th victory of the season against only five defeats.

### TRANS-ATLANTIC PHONE CIRCUITS TO BE CONSTRUCTED

Establishment of three new trans-Atlantic telephone circuits to supplement the present single circuit is now being planned, according to an announcement from the American Telephone and Telegraph company just received by J. R. Farrington, telephone manager here.

The number of telephone calls between America and Europe during the first eight months of 1928 represented an increase of 200 per cent over the same period in 1927, the announcement pointed out, adding that it was necessary to provide the new circuits in order to keep abreast the growing use of the trans-Atlantic service.

Actual construction of the sending and receiving stations for the new trans-Atlantic voice channels is expected to be under way in the near future, it was said.

The announcement, in part, follows:

"A tract of land comprising approximately 800 acres has been secured by purchase and lease seven miles north of Trenton, N. J. Here it is planned to begin construction at an early date of short wave transmitting stations which, together with receiving stations completed or planned by the American Telephone and Telegraph company at Netcong, N. J., and similar installations in Great Britain, will provide three additional circuits for trans-Atlantic calls."

### DELANEY WINS BY K. O. BUT FAILS TO DISPLAY OLD FORM

(Associated Press Licensed Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—Jack Delaney, once the colorful "ruler of the north," has come back—but not so far as he has gone back. Returning to the ring at Elbein Field last night for his first fight since he was knocked out by Jack Sparkey last April, Delaney scored an unimpressive technical knockout over Nando Tassi of Italy in eleven rounds.

For nine rounds it looked as if the battle would go the full 15 frames with Delaney the winner on points. In the tenth the

Bridgeport boxer landed a flurry of lefts on the Italian's face and inflicted the first real damage of the bout. After 25 seconds of the eleventh had passed Roberto Eddie Forbes stepped in to save Tassi from further punishment.

Although Tassi fought gamely and attempted to carry the battle to his opponent, Delaney was easily the master and looked bad principally because he could not end the bout sooner. Tassi went down three times, slipping twice and once, in the first round, half slipping and half beaten down. He took a count of eight that time and came up undamaged.

Both fighters came into the ring over the light heavyweight limit, Delaney weighing 181 pounds and Tassi 175.

### GIRL WHO KILLED BABY IN HER CARE IS ADJUDGED SANE

OAKLAND, Calif., Sept. 20.—Erna Janoschek, 17-year-old high school girl who killed a baby entrusted to her care, today faced a sentence in San Quentin. The jury hearing her case returned a verdict late yesterday holding her sane. This was equivalent to a murder conviction.

Judge Fred V. Wood, who will pass sentence upon the girl Monday, may adopt any one of three courses. He may impose a sentence of life, a sentence of five years to life, or one of from one to ten years.
