of Hoover. I want him to vote for Hoover and not for me. "But on the other hand," he continued, "I have the right to say that any citizen of this country who believes I can promote its welfare, may I appeal of entering the ship of state safely through the next four years and then vote against me because of my religion, he is not a real, pure, genuine American."

Smoke Screens Charged The nominee said that the "cry of Tammany Hall" which former Senator Owen had raised in a letter to Senator Simmons, democratic North Carolina, and printed in the congressional record, which "accusing more or less that a red herring that is pulled across the trail in order to throw us off the scent."

He said a North Carolina woman who called on him recently at Albany, told him that the amount of anti-Smith propaganda that was being sent into her state "could not be printed and distributed for less than a million dollars."

"Senseless" Attacks "Where is the money coming from?" he asked, and then told of an account he had read where a woman went into the national committee in Washington and "miskely" walked up to the man in charge and said: "I want some literature on Governor Smith; I want the non-political kind. And he brought her downstairs, put her in an automobile and took her over to an office where a paper is published, called the 'Fellowship Forum' which for a number of years has been engaged in this senseless, foolish, stupid attack upon the Catholic church and the members of that faith."

Prior to the democratic convention the governor said the grand dragon of the realm of Arkansas wrote to one of the delegates from that state saying he would not vote for Smith "on the ground of upholding American ideals and institutions as established by our forefathers."

"Now, can you think," the nominee asserted, "of any man or any group of men gathered together in what they call the Ku Klux Klan that profess to be 100 per cent American, and forget the great principle that Jefferson stood for, the equality of man, and forget that our forefathers in their wisdom, foreseeing probably such a sight as we look at today, wrote into the fundamental law of the country that at no time was a religion to be regarded as a qualification for office."

After denouncing as "lies," a series of reports he said had reached him, the governor continued: "Of course it is very fine for the republican national committee and the republican chairman to disown all this in a very easy way for them to say. We disclaim knowledge of it and responsibility for what Mrs. Wheeler said."

There is separation of church and state for you," the nominee asserted, and then asked amid applause: "What would be said around this country if a member of my cabinet, if an attorney of the democratic administration at Albany, were to appear before a convention of Roman Catholic clerics and make that kind of a statement?"

Shows Another Slander Referring to an item which he said was printed on the front page of a publication by the Ashland Avenue Baptist church of Lexington, Ky., and which called attention to the fact that the printed "how Governor Smith came near to a serious accident driving 30 miles an hour down Broadway while intoxicated." The governor said everybody knows he cannot operate an automobile.

"I turned that publication over and looked on the inside," he continued. "I saw that on the Sunday following its publication all seven copies of the morning, the subject of worship was to be 'What Think Ye of Christ?'"

"Now I am compelled to the observation," he declared, "that the man or men responsible for that libelous slander against my character cannot possibly believe in Christ."

Branding as another "lie" a report that while governor he had appointed only Catholics to office, the governor said even of "Ham, Ham," directed at the Baptist minister on the platform, read a list of his appointments showing a good portion of protestants and Jews in his cabinet, in the state judiciary and county offices.

Fresh Quiz Ignored Governor Smith ignored a series of questions contained in a full page advertisement in newspapers here asking "Further enlightenment" on the matter presented to him in similar manner in Omaha, 7-8, and which he answered extemporaneously at the close of his last speech there Tuesday night.

Orating with vigorous sweeping gestures and at times assuming a

crouching position as he came down, with a swing of the arm to emphasize a point, the governor brought his address to a close with his appeal for a clean, unobstructed campaign.
