FLOWER TALKS

NOW IS THE TIME TO PLAN AND PLANT THE 1929 GARDEN

Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of "Flower Talks," suggesting to News-Review readers what and how to plant gardens this fall in preparation for next year. The articles are written for NEA Service by Romaine B. Ware, magazine contributor on horticulture.

MOTHER NATURE seems to try to outdo herself in the fall garden. She crowds a glorious array of brilliant color into one grand display, seeming to sense that this is the end of the season and the last chance to show them in all their glory.

If your garden is not fairly alive with color this fall you have overlooked a great opportunity. There are so many things that bloom at this time. Among the hardy plants that give color now we have the Helenium in its yellow, terra cotta and gold; the well known annuals Zinnia, Calendula, and Marigolds; perennial Gaillardia and Coreopsis, as well as the hardy Anemones.

In sections where they are hardy, there are the beautiful and showy Japanese Anemones and the Chrysanthemums. There are a great many other plants and shrubs that give good color at this season and if you will be on the lookout for them you can plant to get some delightful garden pictures. Every gardener can be an artist, painting with lavish masses of living color, in shades and tints never seen upon an artist's canvas.

But if you are to have these garden pictures you must plan and plant them. This fall you must make notes of the places where your garden lacks color and see what you can devise to fill out the bare places. Then you must plant and next season you will have color where you want it.

Your garden is a great opportunity and you can take advantage of it if you will. Visit the local nursery and note the things that are in bloom at this time and you will get some ideas that will help you to make yours a better garden.

FUR COATS ARE AS INDIVIDUAL AND ELABORATE AS NEW GOWNS

Even in Uneven Hemline and Molded Silhouette, They Follow the Mode

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Now fur coats are shown by their collars and cuffs, down to the hem, to establish their identity with the 1929 winter season, so farthing towards individuality and feature the flares, the fluted silhouette, uneven hemlines, and other fashion notes of the season.

For this year are treated like fabrics in the way they are knotted, frilled and flared. As a result, fur coats that are really pleasurable are the season's choice.

Irresistible, curled, oval, astrakhan, seal, summer velvet, and shaggy lamb seem to be the favorite. Fresh skins are relegated to the role of trimming. Of course mink, beaver and coyote are excellent, but these are really staples and as such do not exemplify seasonal styles.

Reddish Browns Popular

Color plays a part in fur coats as well as in frocks and accessories.

Two new shades, logwood seal and casaba second autumn's favor, are reddish browns. Logwood seal is a medium brown with reddish gold and casaba is a deep, dull red as brown can come. Astrakhan is used in a light grey shade that is new, too.

Collars are apt to be conspicuous this year, often in contrasting fur. A huge Johnny collar, as used on one natural Russian fitch with beautifully matched patterns, jacket collars, exaggerated shawl collars with flared tiers for lapels, standing collars with a bow of contrasting fur in the back, convertible high-low collars of two furs, and even the kerchief collar, or blanding angles all are seen.

Flared sleeves are featured in many afternoon fur coats. Most of the diversity of cut comes from the diversity of cut, contrast, but the elbow, flared, ruffled and straight sleeves are good, too. An evening coat of ermine features huge mandarin sleeves, faced with deep blue velvet.

Retain Short Jackets

When furs are introduced in a coat, they usually are of self-fur.

and are knee length or hip girdles. Sometimes ruffles are posed on a straight line coat, diagonally, or are cut circularly and applied straight.

An understanding fashion of autumn is the fur jacket. This is inevitable, for summer proved how popular jackets are with women and the dinner jacket of sparkling, polished, even children frocks finds its counterpart in the fur jacket of smart cut and color for daytime over a "fitch" frock.

One such is shown today, smart for three reasons. First, because it is a jacket instead of a long coat; second, it is the new casaba shade; third, because of its unusual ruffs and collar. Here we see how fur is handled like fabric, because beige-colored summer evening fashions have a fur collar that can be fashioned to make an extremely tall one about the head. It is made of natural summer ermine.

Plain satin, in matching color, is the season's preference for an ornamental applied design in color over the lining. Some evening coats have sumptuous, colorful transparent veils. But winter coats do not, as a rule, ask anything except service of their linings.

and the ends of the ermine flare to give an extremely flattering and snappy decoration. The sleeves have insets of ermine to give them a wide cut and the top of the linings flare as the lapels do.

American broadtail is used to fashion a stunning and unusual coat with circular ruffles around the lower edge, two of them on the sleeves, one making a flap for the side pocket and one extending around the outside of the military collar.
