HON. JAMES C. FULLERTON IS DEAD, AGED 79

(Continued from page 1.)

Senator Mitchell in 1891. He also introduced numerous bills into the senate, among others being one providing for a term of the supreme court in eastern Oregon. In 1892 Mr. Fullerton was elected circuit judge of the second district of Oregon, which comprises Douglas, Lane, Benton, Lincoln, Coos and Curry counties, and served in that capacity for six years, during which time, according to the records, more cases were tried, and more business transacted than in any other like period of time previous to his election. Not being a candidate for reelection in 1898, Judge Fullerton resumed his law practice, which he continued until ill health forced his retirement about five years ago. In 1900 he was elected a presidential elector by the republicans, running ahead of his ticket at the polls, and cast his vote for William McKinley for president of the United States.

Judge Fullerton was married in Roseburg, December 16, 1874, to Clara Bannell, a native of Wisconsin, who passed away Aug. 19 of last year. They were the parents of two children, Nathan Fullerton, a local druggist, and Katherine Graham, wife of Dr. T. W. Graham of Gherlin, Ohio.

He also leaves a brother, John B. Fullerton of this city, and three sisters, Mrs. Addie Nichols of Riddle, Mrs. Alice McKenzie of San Carlos, California, and Mrs. Della Melvin, of Reedsport. Another sister, Mrs. Eva Moine, passed away last year.

Politically Judge Fullerton was one of the foremost republicans of Douglas county, and served as city councilman and city attorney. Fraternally he was made a Mason in Laurel Lodge, No. 10, A. F. & A.

N. of which he was master for four years; in 1886 he was elected master of the Grand Lodge of Oregon; he joined Umpqua Chapter, R. A. M., and served as its high priest; was a member of Irishmen Commandery, No. 2, K. T. of Roseburg Lodge, I. O. O. F., with which he united in 1872, and of which he was past noble grand; of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks; and of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, of which he was past master, workman. He was also a member, and past commander of Reno Post, No. 8, G. A. R.; a member and ex-chairman of the county central committee and an ex-member of the state central committee. The body has been removed to the parlors of the Roseburg Undertaking company. Funeral services will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock at the Presbyterian church. Rev. Achon will officiate. Interment will be in the Masonic cemetery with the Masonic ritual.
