MAJOR LEAGUE SEASON ENDED; SERIES NEXT

Small Crowds Attend Final Contests—Yanks Win Game.

HOYT GETS MONEY

Receives \$2000 for Pitching His Team to 22 Victories During the Year.

(Associated Press Sports Writer.) The major league season is done for another season but the Yankees and the Cardinals still have an epilogue to offer. They meet in the world's series starting at New York on Thursday and ending when one team has won four games.

With both pennant campaigns already decided, there was not much to interest the baseball fan in yesterday's closing engagements. Most of the game's faithful stayed away in large numbers, some of them, no doubt, resting up for the excitement that is to come later this week.

With a \$2,000 bonus as incentive, Walter Hoyt, right-handed ace of Miller Huggins' Yankees, pitched the American league champions to a 7 to 5 victory over the Detroit Tigers. Hoyt had been promised "two grand" as they say in the very best pugilistic circles, if he won 22 games this year. He was cut out about rather freely by the Tigers but won his reward with the aid of Babe Ruth's 54th and Lou Gehrig's 27th home runs. Already badly crippled, the Yankees narrowly escaped losing Gehrig's services for the world's series when the big first baseman was struck in the face by a batted ball in the seventh. He collapsed but recovered sufficiently to walk off the field.

The Philadelphia Athletics finished the season two and a half games back of the Yankees when they were thrown for a loss by the Chicago White Sox in general and Job Weiland, a rookie pitcher from the Mississippi valley league in particular. Weiland held the A's to seven hits and fanned nine men. The Sox scored the only run of the game in the seventh when Kamini singled home Reynolds from second base.

Goose Goslin's homer with two on in the fifth was the high spot of Washington's 9 to 1 victory over the St. Louis Browns.

The Boston Red Sox romped to a easy 7 to 2 win over the Cleveland Indians. Phil Todd, getting a home run and three singles.

The St. Louis Cardinals, their second national league championship tucked away, did little but go through the motions at the polo grounds and lost to the runner-up New York Giants, 4 to 2. Karl Hubbell and Fred Frankhouse allowed only six hits apiece but two of the blows of the Cardinal hurler were home runs by O'Farrell and O'Doul. The Giants

thus finished the season two full games behind the champions.

The Chicago Cubs, in third place, took the Cincinnati Reds into camp, 6 to 1, behind good pitching by Percy Jones.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, although no higher than sixth place, ended the season with one more victory than defeats when the Phillies were met and conquered, 5 to 1. It was the first time since 1924 that the Dodgers have finished with a percentage of 500 or better.

The Pittsburgh Pirates, champions of the league last year but no better than fourth place, holders in 1925, and the Boston Braves completed their schedules on Saturday.

ADAM MAGRUDER TO BE ASSIGNED TO SOME JOB

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Rear Admiral Thomas P. Magruder, former commandant of the Philadelphia navy yard who was relieved from duty last fall because of magazine articles he wrote criticizing the navy, may be given a post soon.

Several conferences with high naval officials have been held recently by Secretary Wilbur to consider what disposition would be made of the admiral, who has been "awaiting orders" in Washington since he was relieved of all duties.

Admiral Magruder has two more years to serve before he reaches the retirement age of 64 years. He is of the so-called "upper half" of the rear admirals and received \$8,000 a year salary.

The pirates captured the ship with its 1400 passengers on Wednesday and steered it to Hong Kong Bay, which is north of Bias Bay.

The Chinese quartermaster of the vessel was also killed. The officers killed were: Chief Officer David C. Jones, of New Quay, Wales, and Chief Engineer Henry Thompson of Greenock, Scotland. Captain Plunkett-Cole of the vessel was wounded.

A wireless message from the Ankung stated that the vessel would arrive at Hong Kong this afternoon. The custom of the pirates is to release ships after looting them.

The Ankung left Singapore Straits Settlement, on September 23 for Hong Kong by way of Hailow, Swatow, and Amoy. It was attacked by the pirates in the Gulf of Tonkin.

WOULD BAR AIMEE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) LONDON, Sept. 29.—Representations that Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson, Los Angeles evangelist, should be barred from entering Great Britain have been made to the home office, it was stated there today.

In authoritative quarters, however, it was understood that the home office would not deny Mrs. McPherson admission. It was stated that an immigration officer at any port has the power to prevent an alien landing. Should he have no doubt regarding any particular person's desirability he would consult the home office.

The Daily Mail this morning editorially expressed the hope that the home secretary would look very carefully into the question of Mrs. McPherson's proposed visit, saying: "This California 'woman evangelist' as she calls herself, is coming here to conduct a mission. Those who are interested in serious evangelism work on this side of the Atlantic are convinced her presence can do nothing but harm. Representations have already been made to the home office urging her exclusion as a undesirable alien. The home minister will do well to investigate Mrs. McPherson's conduct in the past."
