There has been only a small amount of interest shown in the contest locally this year, there being but four contestants. All of these are young ladies. No young men have entered. The audition this evening will be open to the public.

The judges will meet at the Umpqua hotel at 7:30 o'clock and will go to the music store together. The singers will be behind a screen, so that the judges will not know who is singing. The names of the contestants have not been announced and will not be made known until after the audition. They will be designated by numbers so that the judges will not know who they have made their awards.

Nine communities in the state have entered the audition. Portland has already selected its representatives, who will be Miss Jeroma Kivaneck and Cloyd Sturdivant.

Miss Kivaneck, who hails from Longview, Washington, is twenty, and is studying voice in Portland where she sings in the choir of the First Congregational church. Her voice has also been heard over Station KGW of the Portland Oregonian. Sturdivant is twenty-five and sings in the Sunnyside Methodist church.

GENE TUNNEY IS ALL READY FOR WEDDING

Bride-to-Be Will Arrive in Naples on Steamer Tomorrow.

VIEWS VOLCANOES

Receives Wireless Message From Miss Lauder Who Says She Is Anxious to See Beloved.

(Associated Press Local Wire) NAPLES, Italy, Oct. 1.—Annured that all his papers would be ready so that he might marry Miss Mary Josephine Lauder anytime after she lands, Gene Tunney rested amid the beauties of Naples today. Decision as to whether the wedding will take place in Naples or Rome, rests with Miss Lauder, who is due here from New York aboard the modern ship Saturnia.

The retired heavyweight champion after his arrival here from Rome received a radio message from Miss Lauder, sent from within territorial waters off Sardinia, saying that she had had a happy voyage but was delighted that the moment of landing was approaching.

"Now I know why the Italians say 'see Naples and you die,'" Tunney said as he looked at the emerald island of Capri and Monte Vespulio towering over the gulf. Tunney had an opportunity to view some of the volcanic activity when he was taken to the picturesque city of Pozzuoli at the northern extremity of the gulf of Naples by United States Consul General Homer M. Byington and United States Consul Alfred I. Nease on Sunday afternoon. There are still thirteen craters in this region from which hot vapors and water rise through the lava. Tunney tested the ground, which on being struck sounds hollow as though there were a vast gulf extending in every direction beneath.

The party went in the evening to the top of the Vesuvio quarter, from where the city and villages and hamlets shining with lights are visible on all sides while a full moon gave a silver glow to the sea. Tunney embraced the panorama with a gesture and said:

"It is truly a spectacle of fairyland."

"It is the best place in the world to make love and marry," one of his followers added.

Tunney told of his experiences since reaching Europe at a stag dinner at Byington's residence Villa Capota, which is one of the most attractive spots atop the hill of Posillipo, which was originally the seat of the aristocratic papae, Vesuvio Pullia.

ROSEBURG SENIOR HIGH WILL PLAY GLENDALE FRIDAY

The first football game to be played by the local high school will take place next Friday, when the players of the Roseburg senior high school meet the Glendale team at Finlay field. This is a pre-season game and is not included on the season tickets which the students are offering for sale.

The Roseburg team has not yet been selected, as Coach Turner has been spending the past two weeks adding the class teams in their last football tournament. The best players from each class have been retained on the first squad and have been scrambling for positions, so that as yet no permanent berth has been allotted, for in some cases even the lettered men are being forced to extend themselves to keep ahead of some of the new comers.

The local team looks much better this season than ever before and Coach Turner is anxious to see how the boys work out against a strange team in Friday's game. According to an agreement with Glendale he can only work his first team during the first quarter of the game, between noon and 1:30. He will select the starting lineup and will arrange to play every first squad man at some point during the game. This system is going to make the game touch sledding for Roseburg, for most of the experienced players will be in the game only the first quarter and after that time the Roseburg team will be made up largely of untried material. Coach Turner, however, expects that this contest will develop and expose the strong points and the weaknesses of the new players so that he will be better able to select the men to fill the places for the heavy schedule that is coming.

The game will give local fans an opportunity to see the kind of material Roseburg has this year, as every player will be seen in action. A small admission price will be charged, the amount being only enough to cover the expense of the game.

Markets

(Associated Press Local Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—Conditions on local wholesale markets were a shade more encouraging at the opening today with trading considerably more active than last week and prices showing a tendency toward greater stability. Greenstuffs were plentiful and a shade firmer than last week's close. Locally grown lettuce of excellent quality was selling at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per crate. White cabbage brought from 25 to 30¢ per pound with red cabbage sold at 30¢ per pound. Green onions were not quite as plentiful and brought from 40¢ to 50¢ per dozen bunches. Other kinds of bunching vegetables and sacked vegetables showed no change in price.

Onions and grapes showed a tendency toward firmer prices. Supplies of both being somewhat reduced from last week. Blueberries remained cheap at 45¢ to 50¢ per box but Lovells and Walkeys at \$1.00 and orange-rites from the Snake river district as 75¢ to \$1.25 per box indicated that the market would be firmer hereafter. Peas were selling at all kinds of prices from \$1 to \$2.75 per box, depending on variety, size and condition. Beans and extra fancy Bartlett's brought the top prices.

Accumulation of country dressed meats carried over the weekend was rather noticeable and an easy undertone prevailed in the market. Hogs were especially slow moving and it was thought prices might recede later in the day as receipts at the North Portland yards were heavy and trading dull.

In the poultry division there were no changes in quotations. Supplies of early over stock being quite normal and trading fairly active with receipts not overly heavy.

Butter and egg markets were firm at Saturday's closing prices.

BULLET FIRED BY FRIEND KILLS MAN

(Associated Press Local Wire) MARSHFIELD, Ore., Oct. 1.—Albert B. Cooper, 35, who went through four years of front line action during the world war without a wound, was shot to death yesterday at Powers, Ore., accidentally, when a bullet fired by a friend killed him. The bullet entered his chest and inflicted a fatal wound in the neck. The man who was shot was the only surviving member of his company.

"Punk" Humphrey, also of Powers, fired his rifle at a moving object 50 yards away, and the bullet splattered three pieces hitting Cooper, one penetrating the abdomen. Humphrey was held on an open charge. He was over- come with grief when the tragedy occurred.

Cooper was a close friend of Mrs. Raymond A. Jew and Mrs. C. C. Williams, of Coquille, who were killed Saturday when a car went off the grade near Cottage Grove, Oregon.
