DUTCH STEAMSHIP REPORTED SINKING

S. S. AMERICA, 4610 North Latitude, 24.30 West Longitude, Oct. 3.—Proceeding to Dutch Steamship Colono in distress and sinking in whole northwest gale. High rough sea. Her position doubtful but have bearings on radio compass.

The above message was sent The Associated Press by Captain George Fried at 5 a. m. today, eastern standard time. The position of the America is approximately 1,000 miles east of Newfoundland. The Colono sailed for Boston from Rotterdam September 25.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The radio Corporation of America picked up an SOS call this afternoon from the steamship Pillett saying that she was sinking fast and expected to be able to keep afloat only 15 minutes after its message was sent.

At 2 o'clock the radio corporation received word that the American had picked up two life boats with men from the Pillett.

"Traveler seems to be on fire," the message concluded.

BANK CASHIER SHOT BY DISGRUNTLED MAN

COLLAX, Wash., Oct. 2.—E. W. Wagner, cashier of the Farmer's National Bank, was deliberately shot down in a murder plot, after having been trailed for 24 hours, it was declared here today by William La Pollette, Jr., prosecutor of Whitman county.

Wagner who is in a hospital here seriously hurt, was shot through the back last night at his home.

The prosecutor said he had established "with reasonable certainty" that the assailant, probably a disgruntled customer of the bank, had stalked his victim for at least 24 hours before the shooting, and that he escaped on a motorcycle.

Miss Betty Mathen, high school girl, said she saw a prowler hiding on the Wagner premises the night before the shooting. The man became alarmed when she approached, and ran to a waiting motorcycle, she affirmed.

Whitman county officers today found the tracks of the assailant around the Wagner premises, they said.

Wagner, although he had recently denied extensions of credit to several farmers, had no known enemies, it was believed. Officers said they would check with the bank in the effort to find someone with a motive.

The man who fired the shot was evidently familiar with Wagner's habits. He fired as the banker walked out on to his sleeping porch. The bullet lodged in the abdomen.

CONTROL EUGENE BANKS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 3.—Control of the United States National bank of Eugene, and the Eugene Loan & Savings bank has been acquired by the Pacific Bancorporation, headed by Charles Hall, president of the Portland National bank, this was announced today by David Auld, vice-president of the two Eugene institutions.

At the same time Mr. Auld stated it is the policy of the Pacific Bancorporation to maintain the individuality of each of the member banks of the federation. The Eugene banks will continue to be officered entirely by Eugene men, and will continue to operate along the same lines as in the past.

There are now ten banks in the Pacific Bancorporation federation, with a total of approximately \$10,000,000 resources.

PIGGY WIGGLY STORE IN PORTLAND ROBBED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 3.—Currency said to be in excess of \$1000 was obtained by an expert cracksmen who succeeded in working the combination of a safe in the office of the Piggy Wiggly store at 165 Fifth street last night.

Sacks containing Tuesday's receipts from several Piggy Wiggly stores were reported to have been stored in the safe. They were taken from the strong box to a small room in the rear of the store, where they were opened. More than \$100 in silver from the various sacks was left scattered about the floor. Only paper was taken.

Two bandits, one of whom apparently held a revolver in his coat pocket, entered the Union Oil filling station at East 39th and Division streets and held up B. H. Wool sacks, twine and branding paid at Wharton Bros.
