ROSEBURG WINS FROM GLENDALE SCORE 25 TO 6

Roseburg won a hard-fought football game yesterday afternoon in a pre-season contest with the Glendale high school. While Roseburg was on the long end of a 25 to 6 score, the game was a good deal more interesting than the score would indicate.

Glendale high school has an exceptionally fast team, and one that is a real credit to that city. The team is coached by Otto Bager, baseball letterman from O. A. C., who has developed a gridiron organization that is above the average for a school with the attendance of that at Glendale.

The visiting team gave the Roseburg boys some tough sledding, particularly after the local letterman had been removed from the game.

The contest was marred by an unfortunate accident when George Wierda, one of Glendale's star players, went out of the game with a broken leg, which was also dislocated at the knee. The fracture was a few inches above the knee. The loss of this player seriously handicapped the visiting team.

During the first quarter Roseburg played its first string team. The boys got off to a poor start, but finally began making their plays work and crashed through for two touchdowns in that frame. The line did not function as it should, and there was a awful lack of interference for runners, each halfback being forced to fight his way unaided. The first team was considerably heavier than Glendale and the visitors tired out under the attack.

A beautiful end run, however, near the end of the quarter gave Glendale its only score. Neither Roseburg nor Glendale converted and the quarter ended with the score 12 to 6 in Roseburg's favor.

Roseburg's second team went in for the second quarter and immediately got into deep water by fumbling the ball on the kickoff. The second and third quarters were fought out in front of Roseburg's goal line. Glendale tried to punch the ball across, but the local boys were fighting desperately and managed several times to hold the visitors for downs only a few inches from the goal line. Four times Roseburg had to punt from behind its own goal.

In the fourth quarter Coach Turner sent Ira Hall and Elmer Robertson in at halfback positions. These two boys are being used either at end or in the backfield and they exhibited the first really good football that the Roseburg team displayed. Both boys are fast, steady and shifty, and full of fight. With Moffitt carrying the ball they gave him perfect interference for two end runs, and then punched the ball over for the third touchdown, making the score 18 to 6.

Roseburg then took the ball again and with Robertson fighting desperately through the line on off tackle smashes and end runs, the ball was again carried over the Glendale line. This time the goal was converted with a pass, Moffitt to Hall, making the final score 25 to 6.

The game was quite interesting and gave fans their first opportunity to see the Roseburg team in action. Roseburg undoubtedly has a stronger team than last year, but is still very weak in many departments of the game, particularly in affording interference for runners.
