BLIND PATIENTS LAMENT ILLNESS OF NOTED DOCTOR

"He must not die," is the phrase murmured and echoed on the streets.
Dr. Bonine is 65 years old. In his youth he was an athlete at the University of Michigan and in 1886 won the world's championship for the 100 yard dash. He is a member of the Michigan boxing association.
The physicians records show that until he became ill a week ago his average number of patients was 150 to 300 daily.

CRUCIFIX, KEYS KEEP BULLET FROM FUGITIVE'S BODY

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 5.—Billy Snapp, Denver beauty parlor proprietor, is one of the few men who has been struck directly above the heart by a bullet and received no injury other than a slight bump.

The bullet struck directly over Snapp's heart and was stopped by two keys and a crucifix, delivering nothing but a severe blow.
The force of the blow knocked Snapp down. In falling he struck his head and a small bump was the result. It was his only hurt.

SWITCHMAN MUST ANSWER FOR WRECK THAT KILLED 18

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Harry Stockdale, alias Harry King, subway towerman alleged to have thrown the switch which caused the recent Times square wreck in which 18 persons were killed and more than a hundred injured, was arraigned in homicide court today charged with second degree manslaughter. In default of \$25,000 bail, he was committed to the Tombs to await action of the grand jury.

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U. S. Moves to Check Annual Losses on Hides and Skins

(Associated Press United Wire)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Needless losses in the total value of hides and skins, estimated at approximately \$20,000,000 annually, will be at a height in November, when farmers slaughter their winter supply of meat.
Long lamenting the careless or wasteful methods in skinning animals and curing hides, the department of agriculture has sent two experienced men into the field, one in Pennsylvania and eastern Ohio and the other in the states of Virginia and North Carolina to urge against waste. Through government bulletins, F. P. Vetch, senior chemist in charge of the federal leather and paper laboratory, and his associates, are broadcasting similar messages.

The department's activity has been augmented by a conference with representatives of hide dealers, tanners, butchers, cattle raisers, dairymen and farmers, who are seeking to stop a leak in their business. Committees, with a personal selected from the departments of agriculture and commerce and from interested industries, will study classification and grading of hides and skins; skinning and curing practices; grub eradication; manges and other physical diseases; brands and other physical injuries; and statistics on production.
Hides and skins, most important raw materials of the tanning industry, are products of the farm-leather.

Country hides and skins make up about one-third of all those produced in the United States, and their condition on arrival at the tannery is of vital interest to all who use leather.

"Too often," authorities say, "the value of country hides for leather making is less than that of packer hides, because less care and skill are shown in the take-off and in curing and handling. In consequence the hide trade discriminates between country and packer hides and skins, and pays less for the former."

"Hides is the basic goods of all leather, and leather is a present-day essential in every walk of life. Our domestic hide supply is falling shorter and shorter of our leather requirements. Every year millions of pounds of hide substance are needlessly lost through ignorance and indifference."

The department of agriculture says that improvement in the country branch of the hide and skin industry is absolutely necessary to put it upon a more economic basis.
