FALL ANXIOUS FOR TRIAL AS SOON AS HEALTH PERMITS

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 6.—Albert H. Fall, former secretary of the interior, hopes to be tried at an early date as his health will permit, on a charge pending against him of defrauding the government in the Teapot Dome oil case, he said here last night.

Fall expressed the desire to have the trial held "not later than April" and asserted that he believed he would be in condition at that time to stand a trip to Washington where the case would come up.

The former secretary said that the only charge pending against him is one wherein he is charged jointly with Harry F. Sinclair with defrauding the government. The charge of bribery against himself and Edward Doheny has been disposed of, he asserted.

"My friends are eager for me to have this matter over with," Mr. Fall continued. "They, with me, are confident of acquittal and wish me to be clear of the charge, but they fear for me to go to Washington because of my health before spring."

Fall has been in the care of a physician at his home here for several weeks. He is said to have improved greatly in health since his return from a California sanatorium, but his intimates say he is still very weak.

HEALTH UNIT TO AID IN HONOR ROLL SCHOOL PROGRAM

An honor roll program, combining scholarship and health activities, will be put on in the Douglas county grade schools this year, with the county health unit cooperating with the school officials and instructors.

The requirements for the honor roll are made difficult in order to stimulate interest. Students in order to qualify must be 100 per cent in attendance at school, conduct 100 per cent, observation of health habits 90 per cent scholarship 90 per cent, and it will also be necessary that the pupil have all needed corrections of the teeth, eyes, ears, nose and throat made.

The dental inspection will be carried out through the Douglas county survey by Dr. Keith Brunk, who is now conducting a similar survey in Klamath county.

Provision for the examination of the eyes, ears, nose and throat will be made so that the work will be done either by the county health officer, during school inspections, or, if preferred, by the family physician.

This program has been very successfully carried out in Marion and Jackson counties for several years. Usually a parade of the honor pupils is held in the spring at the end of the school year.

The percentage of health corrections has been increased as has the stimulation to better school work as a result of these programs. The success of the activity depends upon the cooperation of the parents, school officials and health agencies and it is to be hoped that the celebration this spring will represent a higher percentage of scholarship and health for Douglas county.

SACRAMENTO WINS 2ND HALF CROWN IN COAST LEAGUE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—The Sacramento Solons are champions of the Pacific coast league for the second half of the split season.

By pounding four San Francisco Seal pitchers for a total of 19 hits, the Solons won 10 to 7 in the second game played off here yesterday, having taken the first game Saturday in the state capital.

Some 17,000 fans saw the game, in which the visitors took the lead in the first inning. The Solons made a six run drive in the eighth but the Seals' lead was too great to overcome. Sacramento made four homers with Koehler, Menner and Osborne doing the honors. As a result of Sacramento's victory, the two teams will play a 7 game series for the championship of the league. The games will be as follows: Wednesday, October 10, San Francisco; Thursday and Friday, Sacramento; Saturday and Sunday, San Francisco; Tuesday, October 16, Sacramento; and Wednesday in San Francisco if the series is even to that point.

ed by the cries, the bewildered prisoners ran about hopelessly, struggling futilely with each other between the rows of bunks, seeking to reach doors and windows that were barred.

Baker Proves Hero
At this juncture, William O'Malley, a prisoner from Cleveland, began his efforts to save the other men that made him probably the hero of the occasion. O'Malley and Tony Vachio, also of Cleveland, are employed in the bakery at the north end of the building. When they heard the alarm they rushed to the huge bolted door that separated kitchen, bakery and dining room from the dormitory and attempted to open it. With the aid of El White, negro, on the dormitory side of the structure, they succeeded in breaking down the door opening another avenue of escape. O'Malley estimated 150 prisoners made their way to safety through that route.

Later O'Malley and White ran around in a side window of the dormitory where prisoners still were vainly struggling to escape and, using pieces of pipe as levers, attempted to break open the windows but were unable to do so.

Exits Are Opened
Shortly after the fire was discovered, Captain D. H. Howell, commanding the guard at the brick pen, who lives in a house on a hill above the plant, was awakened by the shouts. He came out immediately and ordered the guards to open all the doors. There were five exits from the dormitory.

The prisoners who had escaped from the flames except dormitory were huddled in the office and in the garage. Chester Welch, of Cleveland county, serving time on a robbery charge, assumed charge of the situation until prison officials arrived, and flanking wires from the plant were down west to Junction City, two miles away, to telephone T. A. Young, superintendent, at his home in Columbus. He also called physicians.

It was said that three or four were severely burned they probably would die.

With the coming of daylight res-

cue workers found a gruesome task facing them.

The dormitory, a temporary structure, consisted of a corrugated iron covering on a wooden frame erected on a brick foundation six to ten feet high with a wooden floor. The wooden frame and sheet iron covering had fallen into the shallow basement made by the foundation, and with them had fallen the prisoners' beds.

Searchers from the top of the foundation wall looked down into a tangle of steel rods, scraps of sheet iron, charred timbers and wire, and could see scraps of clothing and dark masses of charred bodies here and there.

It was considered likely that many of the prisoners reported missing may be among those whose bodies lie in the ashes of the flimsy dormitory building.

The eight most seriously burned were taken to the penitentiary hospital at Columbus early today. The remainder of the badly hurt were taken to Columbus in trucks sent from there.

MEDFORD PLANS ISSUE \$110,000 AIRPORT BONDS

MEDFORD, Oct. 6.—Since Circuit Judge J. W. Hamilton upheld the constitutionality of the Roseburg airport bonds, the airport committee of the Chamber of Commerce has completed full plans for a class A airport here, and will present them to the city council at its next meeting. It is believed the court decision will be sufficient authority for holding a bond election. The proposed bonds will amount to \$110,000.
