JUNIOR HI TO MEET ASHLAND HERE SATURDAY

Fast Football Game Expected to Open the Season.

SCHEDULE OUTLINED

Local School Has Strong Squad This Year and Is Facing a Hard Program.

The junior high school football team will have its first game of the season Saturday afternoon starting at 2-15 o'clock when it meets the team from Ashland for high school at Friday field. The Ashland team is reported to be heavy and fast, and the Roseburg boys are working hard to get in shape to meet the visiting aggregation.

The junior high school this year has an exceptionally good team considering the age and size of the boys in the student body. The school, since it was started, has always maintained high athletic standards and has given local fans some real exhibitions of athletic prowess, particularly in basketball and football.

This year the school, it is believed, has the strongest football team it has ever turned out. The squad is coached by G. W. Warberg, who has accomplished excellent results in the short time he has had with the squad. Working in cooperation with Coach Turner of the senior high school, the boys have been trained along a line that will enable them to graduate right into senior high school football, without change of style. The two coaches have worked in harmony and close cooperation with both teams, which is showing its effect in a decided improvement in play.

The junior high school team is above the average in weight and is exceptionally fast. There are a number of the boys who have unusual natural ability as football players and who are consistent in their gains. They kick hard, stay in practice and are quick thinkers. In practice against the senior high school teams they have made a very good showing, and it is believed that they will turn in several good victories for the season.

The game with Ashland will be a real test of their ability. Ashland is reported to have one of the strongest junior high school teams of the state and if the local boys can beat Ashland then they will stand a good chance of winning all of their other games. They have arranged a tentative schedule calling for games here with Medford, Oakland, Myrtle Creek, and including two trips away from home, one a return game with Ashland and a game at Cottage Grove.

It is hoped to be able to schedule the Medford game as a feature of the Armistice Day celebration on November 12. Medford is now booked for Saturday, November 10, but if suitable arrangements can be made with the local committee in charge of the Armistice Day celebration it is quite probable that the Medford game will be played here on Monday, which will be the day observed as Armistice Day. Medford and Roseburg junior high schools are developing a strong but friendly rivalry, and their games each year are well attended.

Coach Warberg stated today that he will probably use as his starting lineup Saturday, Robertson, left end; Ludy, left tackle; Peterson, left guard; Baker, center; Strawn, right guard; Ochoke, right tackle; Covert, right end; Johnson, quarter; Liles, fullback; Zemon, fullback; and Little, halfback. He will have a strong squad of reserves including Strickland, Crawford, Parker, Berke, Peck and several other boys who have been training on regularly for practice and who will doubtless take a chance to get into the game on Saturday.

It is the hope of the junior high school that the game will be well attended by the fans of the city. The school board expects a large crowd to be present at the game, and the school is planning to have a large number of concessions for sale at the game.

CANADIAN WHISKY EXPORTS TO U. S. SHOW BIG INCREASE

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 9.—Canada's exports of whisky to the United States increased in value from \$17,471,437 for the previous year to \$25,629,156 for the 12 months ending last August 31, it was shown here today in official Canadian trade figures. Exports of beer and ale decreased in value.

During April, May and June of this year, according to the figures, the United States absorbed the total export of Canadian whisky—44,800 gallons, valued at \$1,010,355. This was a heavy increase over the corresponding period of 1927.

JACKSON COUNTY SURVEY MAY MEAN RAILWAY PROJECT

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 9.—A surveying crew, employed by the Owen Oregon Lumber company of this city, under the direction of General Manager James H. Owen, have been working the last fortnight, in eastern Jackson county, in the territory lying between Butte Falls and Klamath Falls.

They are making a map of the section also a map of what the engineer considers the most feasible route for a railroad. Members of the surveying party submitted the map to General Manager Owen yesterday.

The company for two years has been studying the section and feasible rail routes through it. According to Manager Owen, the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, in the development of the Klamath county interests, has built a logging railroad to Spencer Creek, for a distance of about 25 miles.

This affords a possible rail entrance into the dead Indian country of Jackson county, where there are several large stands of timber. Manager Owen said today that the engineering crew had been ordered to Butte Falls to make a survey to improve the grade of the Medford Logging railroad, a subsidiary of the Owen Oregon Lumber company, a standard gauge railroad. He explained that the operations of his company were in no way connected with any other concern and cautioned the public against placing credence in rumors of railroad development in southern Oregon.

A Contrast in Principles and Parties

Republican

For the protection of labor, industry, agriculture and citizenship the Republican party started the protective tariff. The Paine-Aldrich bill which was wiped out by democratic leadership in 1913 and the Fordney-McCumber bill which went into effect in 1922, closed America's doors to the free entry of European manufactured goods, produced by cheap labor, and the livestock and agricultural products of South America, New Zealand and Australia. Under these a duty of 42 cents a bushel was placed on wheat; 15 cents a bushel on corn; 1 1/2 to 2 cents a pound on cattle; 50 cents per hundred pounds on potatoes; \$2 a head on sheep and 31 cents per pound on scoured wool.

Democratic

The Democratic party has always opposed a high protective tariff. It stands for "tariff for revenue only" or a "competitive tariff." When the Underwood law went into effect these followed in its wake a near panic that was only averted by the World War in Europe. Wheat, corn, cattle, sheep, wool, potatoes and other products were placed on the free list. The farmer suffered from foreign competition, and scores of factories closed down and brought on unemployment and bread lines. Revenue for government expense became so low that the Stamp Act of October 22, 1914, went into effect and a tax was required on all notes, deeds and mortgages and perfumes and other sundries.

The tariff is the safe-guard of American industry, agriculture and commerce. If changes are to be made in existing tariff laws they can best be entrusted to friends in the tariff party—the Republican party. Protection against foreign competition means prosperity.
