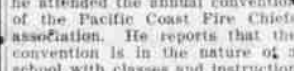
Back From Convention—

CHANCELLOR MADE MEMBER OF UNION OF BRICKLAYERS

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, who made quite a reputation as a bricklayer while handling a trowel in the building operations at his home in Kent last summer, has joined the amalgamated union of building trades workers. The chancellor, who paid his entrance fee by check, will receive his union card shortly.

Notifying the new recruit to trades union ranks that he will be pleased to enroll him as a member, James F. Lane, divisional secretary, sent Mr. Churchill a copy of the rules mentioning the entrance fee of five shillings and a weekly contribution of nine pence. "This," Lane wrote, "entitles you to a pound a week should you be called out on strike and to additional unemployment benefits should you at any time fall out of employment."

Under the regulations any one employing the chancellor as a bricklayer in the future must pay him the minimum wage.

ELECTION BOOTH BURNED

DEATH PENALTY IS SCORED BY CANON OF WESTMINSTER

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The Rev. Canon F. L. Donaldson, canon of Westminster, believes that the death penalty is the supreme remnant of barbarism in modern life and is doomed by the moral consciousness of civilized man.

Speaking at a meeting called to support a movement to abolish the death penalty, he said:

To say that society may kill while the individual may not is to confound morality. Hanging is a deadly sin because its cruelty and tortures should have no place in punishment and the murderer is tortured for weeks by the expectation of violent death. The torture of his wife and children is unbearable.

Big Campaign On

An extensive offensive against the death penalty has been launched by a coterie of noted men and women in England. When parliament meets again it will have before it a petition asking for the abolition of capital punishment.

Simultaneously with the inauguration of the present "drive," a satirical attack on the institution of capital punishment has made its appearance under the title of "A Handbook on Hanging," by Charles Duff. The book is ornamented on its cover by a picture of men hanging from gallows. The title-page says the book is "A short introduction to the fine art of execution, and containing much useful information on neckbreaking, throttling, strangling, asphyxiation, decapitation and electrocution, as well as data and wrinkles for hangmen, an account of the late Mr. Berry's method of killing and his working list of drops, to which is added a hangman's ready reckoner and certain other items of interest."

LEGION STAGES GREAT PARADE IN CONVENTION CITY

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 10.—Putting behind them three days of intense merry-making, climaxed by the most unarmy parade San Antonio ever saw, legionnaires today turned to the serious business of the tenth annual American Legion convention.

Convention business did a "parade rest" yesterday while the gay delegates and visitors passed in amusing review, before their war-time commander, General John J. Pershing, their present commander, Edward E. Stafford, Field Marshal Allenby, Great Britain; Governor Dan Moody, and other military and civilian notables.

Strung out over a three-mile route, the former soldiers, sailors and marines, attempting to keep time to the confusion of music furnished by 51 rifle and drum corps and 29 bands which interspersed the line of march, filed past the reviewing stands in front of the Alamo, Texas' Shrine of Independence.

Four hours was required for the parade to pass. More than 10,000 veterans watched the march, though a considerably larger number started. Many were forced out by overtaxed feet and sultry south Texas heat.

The parade, however, did not exhaust the marching resources of the legionnaires as the annual parade of the 49 and 8, which in the past has been more colorful than the legion parade, was scheduled for tonight. The parade of the fun-makers usually is not as long a procession, but the forty and eight are fresh and funny as possible. To top off the day they will hold their annual "wreck" or initiation, the high spot of their funmaking.

The contest for the national commandership was believed to have narrowed down to a contest between General Roy Hoffman, of Oklahoma City, General Albert L. Cox, of North Carolina, and Captain John D. Ewing, of Shreveport, La., although several "favorite sons" continued to be mentioned. Nearly every department caucused last night.

HUGE MOVIE COMBINE

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 10.—A \$200,000,000 motion picture combination through which Warner Brothers Pictures, Inc., obtains control of the Vitaphone Corporation, the Stanley company of America and First National Pictures, Inc., was announced last night in a joint statement issued by H. M. Warner, president of Warner Brothers and Vitaphone, and Irving D. Rosheim, president of Stanley company and First National.

Frank Clemens, counselman from Ward One, today withdrew his name from nomination and will not be a candidate for reelection. He has served for four years in a very efficient manner, and as long as there are other men willing to take the position he desires to retire from the council work, which requires much time and attention. His petition had been prepared and filed by friends, but he asked that it be withdrawn.

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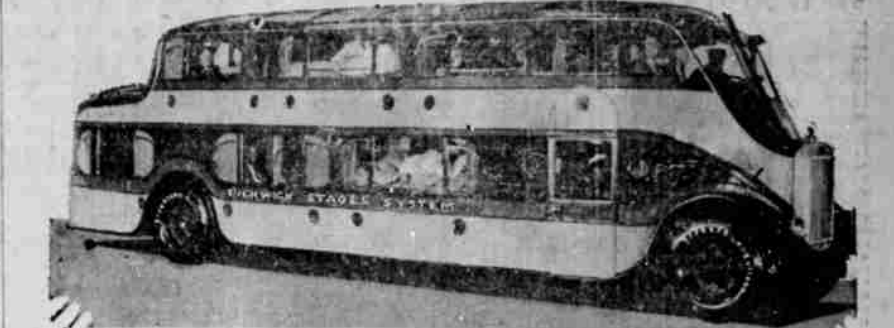
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World's First Sleeper Stage Is Displayed by Pickwick System at Terminal Hotel



Roseburg people today had an opportunity of viewing the latest and most spectacular development in motor stage transportation, when the Nite Coach, world's first sleeper stage, was displayed here at the Terminal hotel.

Roseburg is one of the few cities included in the itinerary of the Nite Coach on its first tour. While on display here the public was permitted to go through the bus and inspect its unique features. When exhibited at the Pacific Southwest exposition in Long Beach, according to actual count 255,000 people passed through the Nite Coach. Several times that number viewed the car from the outside.

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
