ASSOCIATED OIL COMPANY PLANE PAYS VISIT HERE

The Associated Oil company's flying office, a Boeing airplane especially built for the oil company's work, arrived in Roseburg today on a trip of inspection. E. B. Bronte, head of the company's aviation department, R. A. Gardner, pilot, B. J. Brown, of the engineering department, and H. K. Rothe, mechanic, accompany the ship. The plane is stopping in all of the landing fields in the territory served by the Associated Oil company which embraces nearly all of the western states. The flight is being made for the purpose of securing data on each field to enable the company to work out further details of its aviation program, which is now confined largely to airport development. The plane left Eugene this morning and is visiting Medford, Grants Pass and Ashland. It remained at the local airport during the noon hour, while the fliers had lunch here. They are well pleased with the local field and state that when it is improved it will be one of the best in the state. The plane in which they are making their trip has a fully equipped desk in the cabin where office work may be carried on while the plane flies from place to place.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11.—Police had no trace today of three bunco men who obtained \$3,350 from Meyer Feves, a shoe dealer, yesterday. One of the men posed as a smuggler with eight diamonds, another as a customer of Feves who found a "diamond broker" and the third as the broker, who borrowed \$3,350 from Feves, promising to return the sum in a few hours with \$259 interest. The "diamonds" were glass.

SEPTEMBER FIRE LOSS IN OREGON SHOWS GAIN

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 11.—With a total of 177 fires reported in Oregon outside of Portland during the month of September, aggregating a loss of \$352,000, as compared to 172 fires and a loss of \$250,000 the same month last year, State Fire Marshal Clarence A. Lee again stressed today the need of organized effort by the public for a reduction of fire rate. The September loss, however, was \$100,000 less than for the preceding month of August and \$227,000 less than in July, this year.

The total fire loss in the state for the nine-month period ending September 30 was \$3,636,000, while for the corresponding period in 1927 it was \$2,489,000.

The heaviest losses for September were the destruction of a logging camp in Clarkamas county with a loss of \$100,000, the burning of the Elks building at The Dalles with a \$14,230 loss, and the \$12,500 loss of a sawmill and equipment in Yamhill county.

The telephone company had brought a special line aboard ship to make this possible.

Goodbye to Wife

Then as the boat threw off its lines, it slipped away from the dock without the commander. For at the same moment he had stepped ashore for another farewell word with his wife. She had accompanied him to the dock an hour before and waited in the automobile until he boarded the ship. Then she slipped aboard unnoticed by the army of cameramen who had been striving to snap a picture of the couple together. Smilingly and modestly she refused to pose. That leave taking was a simple handclasp, an exchange of steady looks and a few words. Then each turned to their jobs.

Byrd's two or even three years of sailing in the black spaces of the "map" and his wife's keeping of their home for his return.

A speed boat was pressed into service by Commander Byrd to overtake the big whaler and he was hauled over the stern which hung low in water with the boats 10,000 tons cargo.

Searchlights of the battlefleet twinkled their messages of good wishes and Commander Byrd picked them up as they flashed in the code.

Tugs and small boats and a coast guard cutter with a band followed the Larsen to the breakwater, a couple miles from the point where she had been docked. In the outer harbor the whaler stopped to pick up a couple sling loads of explosives which she had parked on a barge when she had entered the port.

Well Prepared

Then running out to sea she was on her way to New Zealand and her rendezvous with three other craft of the Byrd expedition. Together the four will proceed southward to the Bay of Whales. Two of the craft are strictly exploration ships while the other two, the Larsen and the Sir James Clark Ross, are owned by the Ross Sea Whaling company and on arrival at the destination will take up their whaling trade.

The Ross, the Eleanor Bolling and City of New York, already are well on their way toward New Zealand with other members of the Byrd party and additional supplies.

The laughable part of the Larsen's cargo was made up of articles thrust upon Byrd in the last moments before sailing with instructions to drop them at the South Pole. There were many flags, lodge emblems, fraternity colors, bits of jewelry—everything a member of the party laughingly said, except a sign post for the city limits of Los Angeles.

Secretary Depart

The last moments of departure brought sorrow for one member of Byrd's party. Charles Lofgren, Byrd's secretary, was notified that his mother, Mrs. Anna Lofgren, had died in Everett, Mass., yesterday morning.

Members of Byrd's party included Harold I. June, Ernest S. Balch, Dean Smith, airplane pilots; S. J. Dennis, K. F. Bublir, Jeremiah de Cecca, airplane mechanic; Martin Ronne, sailmaker; Richard J. Brophy, business manager; Ralph Shropshire, hydrographer; Captain Alton Parker, D. S. M. C. aviator; Sergeant Benjamin Rother, mechanic; Charles Lofgren, newspaperman; Russell Owen, New York newspaperman, and William Vandervort, photographer.

tion for me, and my side kept hurting me so I went to Port Angeles on the 5th to see him. I worked for a little while on that date, and my scale book shows several entries, so that I know I am right on that. Another fellow and myself started in about 10 o'clock in the morning in his car. It was raining and we had a little trouble so reached town about the middle of the afternoon.

"I cashed a check for \$42.50 and paid for a room at the Merchants hotel, and then we had a meal at the cafe, and I paid for that. Then I went to the doctor's office but he was not in. I went back to the hotel and stayed around there for a while and then started back to the doctor's office. My companion was fixing the headlights on his car when I left him. I don't remember anything that happened after that.

"How I got off the peninsula and down here in more than I know. I seem to realize that considerable time has passed, but what I have been doing or what has happened to me is a complete blank in my mind. It seems like I have been in this bed for ages."
