Architect Pleased—

John Gilbert in "The Cossacks" Coming to Antlers Tuesday

John Gilbert is an incessant source of surprise with each of his new roles. The Yankee boy in "The Big Parade" was a far different character from his Vronsky in "Love" and "Barabys", and the hero of "Twelve Miles Out" were equally far apart. And now comes something new, even for Gilbert—his role as a swashbuckling, brazened Cossack soldier, who, under his veneer of bravado, has the soul of a poet. It is a complicated role, and one that grips the very heart. It thrills with its sheer drama, and baffles by its truth to life.

Such is John Gilbert as Lukash in "The Cossacks," Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's vivid drama of the Russian steppe, which comes to the Antlers Tuesday.

Information that Gilroy had disappeared was first learned of when William O'Brien, communist candidate for governor of Arizona, advised New York party headquarters that Gilroy had failed to appear here on Tuesday night for a scheduled address. O'Brien attempted to go ahead with the meeting and after being denied the use of an auditorium, he was arrested when he started the assembly on a school campus. He was later released on \$10 bail. Efforts to locate him last night were futile, and no explanation of his whereabouts could be offered by party leaders.

CONTRACT LET FOR C. P. CONSTRUCTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Oct. 12.—Contract for the grading of 83 miles of road bed on the new Southern Pacific line between Alameda, Cal., and Klamath Falls, Ore., was let to the Vlach construction company of San Francisco, which will begin work at once. George W. Boschke, chief engineer of the Southern Pacific railroad, in making this announcement today, said the company already had a contract to grade 12 miles of the new line extending south from Klamath Falls. Work on this part of the project commenced last August. The line when completed will connect the Southern Pacific's Cascade line of the Shasta route with its Nevada-California-Oregon line, which connects with the Southern Pacific Overland route at Ferrel, Nev.

Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—Local wholesale produce markets showed a little more activity here today than during the past few days. Prices were generally steady to a shade firmer on seasonal vegetables with tomatoes and onions noticeably higher. Yakima Spanish type onions were going to the trade at \$3.00@3.25 per sack while Oregon Yellow Danvers were firm at \$3.50 to a shade higher for U. S. No. 1 stock. Tomatoes were in liberal supply but demand was also good and prices were about 10c higher than earlier in the week at 50@55c per 20 pound box. Potato prices today were fully steady at \$1.40 to \$1.60 for U. S. No. 1 grade, while locals and combination grades ranged downward to 75c per hundredweight for No. 2 stuff. Practically No. 1 cauliflower was being offered on the sidewalks today, everything real choice going to fill cartot orders from eastern markets. High medium to good cauliflower was in abundance, however, and met with good demand at \$1.25@1.50 per crate. Supplies of good peaches were limited almost entirely to Salways which sold around 70@90c per box. Orange elings from the Snake river district were in nominal supply, fetching about the same price

Butter and egg markets were firm. No session was held at the dairy exchange yesterday on account of the holiday, so quoted bids to producers will be unchanged until late Monday. Demand for pork was somewhat better on the country dressed meat market and prices were a shade firmer at 13@14c. Other kinds of meats were unchanged but inclined to drugginess. Poultry values were steady and trading was fairly active.

Hogs—(compared with a week ago)—Killing classes 25c higher, feeders barely steady to weak; bulk light butchers for week, \$10@10.25; overweights and underweights, \$9.75 down; extreme heavies down to \$8.50 and under; packing sows mostly \$7.50@7.75; old head smooth offerings, \$8; slaughter pigs, mostly \$8.50, a few up to \$9.00; feeder pigs, mostly \$8.50@9, one strictly choice small lot Monday at \$9.50.

Sheep—Sheep and lambs steady with a week ago; medium to fairly good lambs, \$11.00@11.50; strictly choice kinds absent; heavies and thins \$10.00@10.30; throw-outs down to \$9.00, choice lights and strongweight yearlings, including a few two-year-olds, \$10; choice light ewes, \$6.50; bulk, good to near choice, \$5.00@6.00.

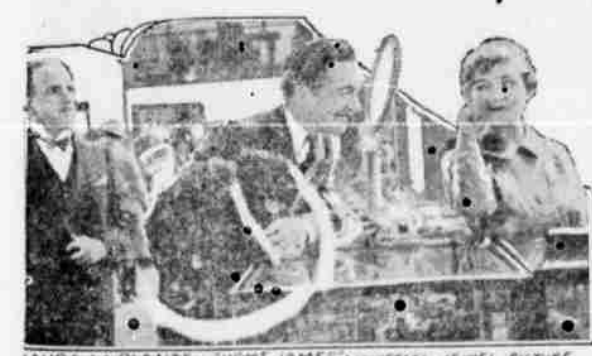
MARION DAVIES IN "THE CARDBOARD LOVER" AT ANTLERS SUNDAY
