ROSEBURG LOSES MYRTLE POINT GAME BY SCORE 19 TO 0

The Roseburg senior high school team was defeated 19 to 0 in the first game of the season played at Myrtle Point yesterday. The Roseburg team had confidently expected to win this game and the defeat was a severe setback to their aspirations. Roseburg outplayed the Coos county boys in the first three quarters of the game, and then "blew up" when the Roseburg halfbacks confused their signals on one play and let Myrtle Point through for a touchdown. On the first kickoff Roseburg held Myrtle Point in her own territory and then drove the ball down to the one-foot line, but lacked the drive to punch the ball through for a score. The first half ended with the score 0 to 0. During all of the period the ball was in the Myrtle Point territory and Roseburg was on the offense.

The third quarter started off the same way, but near the end of that period the Roseburg backs confused their signals and the center threw the ball wild. A Myrtle Point player scooped it up and went through for a touchdown. The play disorganized the Roseburg team and Myrtle Point immediately followed up their advantage with a strong attack. A few minutes later the Roseburg safety juggled a punt and failed to make a return, thereby putting Myrtle Point in position to score again. In the last quarter Entler, Roseburg quarter, injured his leg, and when he attempted to punt from near his own goal line was unable to get the ball away fast enough, because of the injury, and the kick was blocked, so that Myrtle Point was in a position to score for the third time.

The first home game of the season will be played here next Friday, October 19, against Cottage Grove.

RICHFIELD CO. TO BUILD BEACON STATION HERE. Roseburg has been selected as one of the sites for a Richfield beacon station, according to the announcement of the company's plan for its radio beacon expansion program in Oregon. The Richfield Oil company plans to erect 25 beacon stations along the Pacific coast in 1929, and will have their lights placed at suitable locations. Hood River, Salem, Eugene, Roseburg and Medford. Each of these stations, according to the plan of the company, will comprise complete service station facilities, coupled with a towering neon beacon, on a 125 foot steel mast, a visibility of 100 miles being claimed. Neon tubes outlining the buildings of the station also serve as a guide to night flyers. No time for making the installations has been announced. The several oil companies have shown a decided interest in aviation and are doing a great deal to encourage the industry. At the present time they are all working toward the improvement of the airways and are adding in many ways to make these lines of air travel safe and convenient. As the greatest requirement in the power lighting of the coast attention is being given to the installation of beacons. The Richfield neon beacons are not located directly at the airports, but are placed along the
