Lady Grace Drummond Hay, who hopes to be the first woman to cross the Atlantic by air from east to west, radioed her mother, Mrs. S. T. Ledbridge, in England that she found the air voyage wonderfully interesting.

Prayers For Safety

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—One minute of silent prayer for the safety and success of the Graf Zeppelin was observed by audiences and actors in virtually all Broadway theatres last night.

Passage Rough

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—The navy department received a radio-gram from the Graf Zeppelin at 11:45 o'clock eastern standard time today stating that she was proceeding at a reduced air speed of about 50 knots and that her position was 23 degrees north and 15 degrees west.

Aid Requested

The message sent at 6:25 o'clock eastern standard time and 11:25 o'clock Greenwich time, said that the ship was damaged on the port horizontal and that repairs were being effected. It requested that a surface vessel in the vicinity follow the course of the airship.

Landing Aid Ready

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 12.—It may take the Graf Zeppelin 100 hours to cross the Atlantic but once she gets to the naval air station here naval officers say she can be landed in three minutes.

Course Shifted

Another message received from the Zeppelin said that at 2 p. m. Greenwich mean time, or 9 o'clock eastern standard time, the ship was at latitude 23 degrees north and longitude 45 west, which indicated that she had made some progress.

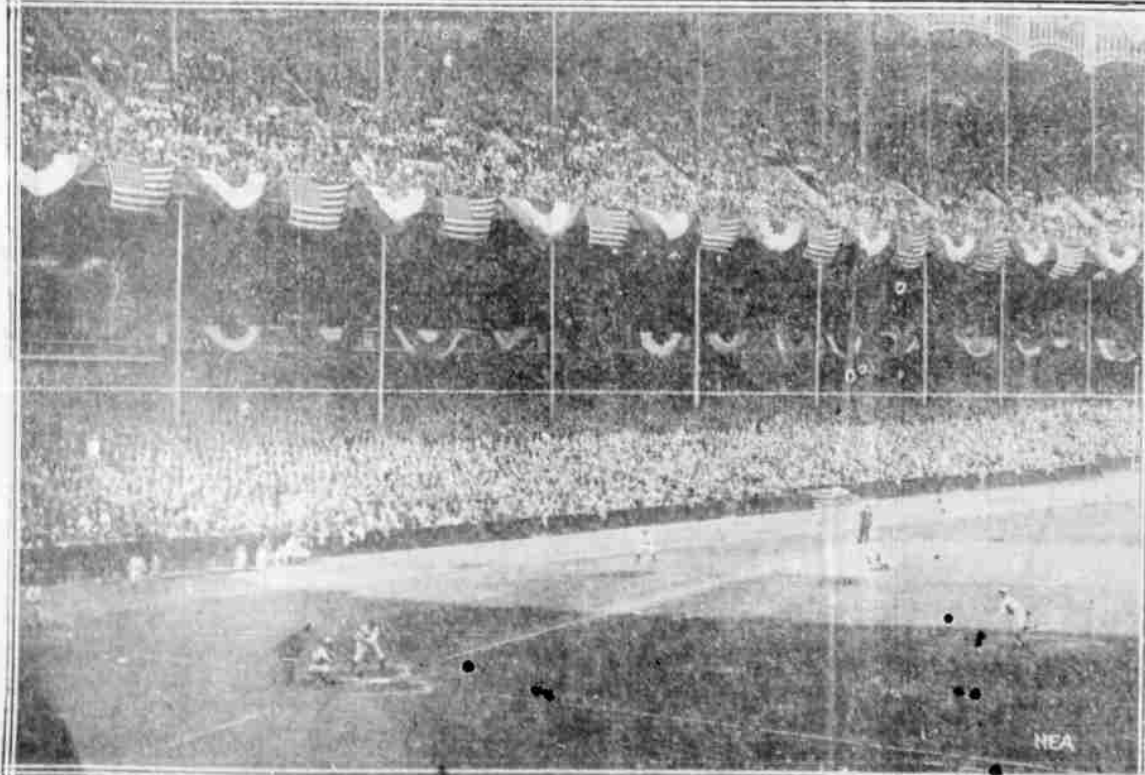
