DEFICIENCIES IN STATE'S FINANCES ARE ACTED UPON

Community Chest Practice and Traveling Expenses of Circuit Judges Are Rapped.

(Associated Press Local Wire)
SALEM, Ore., Oct. 15.—The practice of charitable institutions in Portland that receive state aid also called attention to the community chest was criticized today by Herbert Gordon of Portland, who was chairman of the house ways and means committee at the last session of the legislature. Some of the institutions receive \$15 and some \$20 per month per capita and maintain by various members brought out the fact that they ask an equal contribution through the community chest. It was estimated that some of the more than 400 such institutions acquire as high as \$40 and \$50 monthly per capita on which to operate.

The practice of the state in allowing traveling expenses to circuit judges was declared by John Carlin of Medford, speaker of the house, to be growing into a "repulsive abuse."

Deficiencies Met
The emergency board today authorized various state institutions and activities to receive deficiencies to be covered by the next legislature, in the total sum of \$146,915. This was necessary because of shortage in appropriations made by the 1927 legislature.

Henry W. Meyers, superintendent of the state prison, asked for a deficiency allowance of \$20,000. He remarked, however, that he might be able to get along on \$15,000, so the board allowed \$17,500.

For the payment of interest guaranteed by the state on irrigation district bonds in the sum of \$26,154 was authorized.

Legal Expenses
For the payment of salaries and wages in the state legal department Attorney General Van Winkle was allowed \$1200. His request was for \$111.64. He estimated that about \$500 would be necessary for the additional legal talent to conduct litigation in connection with the liquidation of the French & Co. bank at The Dalles.

Due to special proceedings ordered by the governor, a further extra expense of about \$600 has been incurred, Van Winkle reported.

For the expenses resulting from actions of the 1927 legislature, largely bringing for special sessions and commissions, \$12,750 was allowed. The sum of \$1000 was allowed for the transportation of convicts and \$1000 for traveling expenses of circuit judges. The sum asked for the latter by Secretary of State Ross was \$3000.

Charitable institutions in Portland, caring for orphans and foundlings, were allowed \$22,000 and institutions for wayward girls \$12,000.

JOE DENN HEADS NEWLY ORGANIZED POWDER COMPANY

Joe Denn has just returned from a trip to the northern part of the state where he has completed negotiations in connection with the formation of the Oregon Powder company, a new corporation which is taking over the distribution of dynamite and associated products in northern and eastern Oregon. The company is incorporated with a capital stock of \$25,000. Mr. Denn is president and W. P. Haberkus, of Clackamas, is vice-president.

Mr. Denn is also the owner of the J. A. Denn Powder company, handling dynamite and explosives in southern Oregon so that he is now in charge of the distribution in all of the state of Oregon except Lane and Linn counties. The territory also includes the southern Washington counties tributary to the Columbia river.

The new company was formed through the consolidation and purchase of several agencies. Practically all of the stock in the new company is held by Mr. Denn and Mr. Haberkus.

Roseburg will be the headquarters of the company and all of the business and financial affairs will be handled to this city. A storehouse is being constructed at Clackamas and distribution for the northern part of the state will be made from that point.

COUNCIL REFUSES TO DIVIDE PAVING COST ON ONE LOT

By the unanimous vote of six members present, the city council, in a regular meeting last night, rejected a proposed ordinance to divide the street paving assessment of \$225.46 against one of the two lots on Spruce street on which the house of Attorney Albert Abraham is situated. The ordinance was predicated upon the joint petition of Abraham, his wife and A. L. Carter. The interest of the lot named was not specified in the petition, but it was the apparent understanding among the councilmen that he was either an actual or intended purchaser of the entire property, excepting the lot to be untouched by the ordinance, which was the subject of the ordinance. The ordinance would have segregated from the other half as to liability for cost of paving and abutting street. Mayor Housack declared that segregation of the assessment would weaken the security on the half lot excluding the residence and contended that the assessment should remain intact so that the security for the entire sum. This view was shared by those councilmen who expressed themselves on the matter.

Street Commissioner George A. Frew was instructed to construct an adequate drain on Prospect street to relieve the overflow on Beaman street during the wet season. Two ditches, a stretch of the and a catch basin in the Prospect street sewer are involved in the plans.

Commissioner Frew presented to the council illustrations of street building implements, such as a concrete mixer, roller, grader and screeder, together with prices, all obtained upon a recent trip to Portland at the council's request. After a brief discussion, it was decided to put purchasing plans up to the city budget committee, which will meet next Monday night, October 22.

At the request of the Christian church, a new street light was ordered installed near the church on East Douglas street.

SERIES LECTURES TO AID BUSINESS. EDITORIAL PLAN

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 16.—Plans have been consummated for a statewide business improvement service to be conducted through a series of educational lectures dealing with advertising, according to Harris Ellsworth, field manager of the Oregon State Editorial association. Mr. Ellsworth will leave next week to arrange meetings in Roseburg and the Coos Bay district.

This program will be one of the chief activities of the editorial association this year, and brings to the front one of the original plans which the executive committee of the association had at the time the field manager's office was established. Mr. Ellsworth believes the service eventually will be carried into every city of the state.

Two meetings have already been scheduled, the first taking place at Grants Pass Thursday evening. Mr. Ellsworth, with Frank Jenkins, editor of the Morning Register and president of the chamber of commerce of Eugene, will discuss matters relating to advertising at a dinner on Friday night. Mr. Jenkins will speak at a dinner which is to be given in Medford.

The lectures will be given through the cooperation of the University of Oregon extension division, and will be extended to all communities of the state which have both daily and weekly papers as rapidly as funds can be obtained for carrying on the program. In each case the meeting will be conducted by Mr. Ellsworth, assisted by a prominent advertising man of the state.
