slayer is to be transferred to a room about 30 feet square enclosed by palings and wire. In it is nothing but a steel cot. High above his reach is a light by which he may read if he desires. Outside a guard will pace back and forth as a precaution against any possible attempt at escape.

A few short paces away, through a narrow door, is the scaffold, reached by thirteen steps. Atop the scaffold is a small room in which there will be three men. When the noose is adjusted these three men, at a signal, will cut three small ropes. The small ropes are attached to three larger ropes. At the ends of two of these ropes are weights about equal to the body of an average man. At the end of the other rope will be Hickman. The identity of the men at the ropes will be kept secret. None of the three men will ever know which one cuts the rope that takes Hickman to his death.

NEW YORK SEWER BUILDERS FOUND GUILTY OF FRAUD

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—A supreme court jury today convicted Maurice E. Connolly, former president of Queensborough, and Frederick Seely, former engineer of sewer design, who were tried on charges of conspiring to defraud the city in the construction of the borough's \$29,000,000 sewer system. The jury was out more than 25 hours.

Connolly, who resided under fire last April after having been borough president of Queens since 1911, and Seely were indicted last June with the late John M. Phillips, sewer pipe dealer, for conspiring to profit from Queens sewer work. Phillips died before the trial. Two of three original counts of conspiracy were thrown out by the court at the end of the state's case during the trial.

UNION PROTESTS MEMBER SHIP OF CABINET MAN

LONDON, Oct. 17.—The "Ban-chester branch of the building trade workers' union today sent to the executive council a demand that Secretary George H. H. Wilson be expelled from the union because he accepted Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, as a member of the union.

The branch charged that Wilson had "brought upon the organization public contempt and ridicule" by permitting the entry of the chancellor whose only experience with the craft of bricklaying had been a little amateur building on his own estate. The branch suggested that the membership fee paid by Mr. Churchill be returned to him.

SMITH ATTACKS G. O. P. CLAIMS OF COIN SAVING

Nominee, in Word Pictures, Ridicules Opponents' Economy Record

MISSOURIANS CHEER

Hoover Accused of Making Misleading Statements —Borah Speaks in North Carolina

SEBASTIA, Mo., Oct. 17.—Leaving Missouri to ponder over his triple assault on Coolidge economy, Governor Smith carried his party standard to Chicago, Illinois, today to await the signal for his seventh and last speech of his second campaign tour.

Slashing into republican claims of huge savings in the cost of government in recent years, the nominee, in his address last night before an audience that packed the huge livestock pavilion at the state fair grounds, and cheered him on, painted what he called "three pictures" with economy claims as his model.

After charging his opposition with predicating its campaign upon "misrepresentation," the nominee took up his first picture and asserted that claims that federal expenses have been reduced through "prudent spending," economy and good business methods, formed "one of the grossest fallacies offered by the republican party."

"Picture No. 2," as he called it, led the governor through a maze of figures on what money he said were actually spent during the last two republican administrations, and he was loudly applauded when he said that "all of the departments of the government together in 1927 cost \$206,000,000 more than they did in 1924."

He challenged Herbert Hoover and President Coolidge, who he described as "the chief apostles of economy," to disprove the statistics he read.

For the third picture, the nominee chose as his subject the "select or the postponement of the failure to appropriate for certain well-known wants of the government, and in this connection he charged the Washington administration with a "new kind of trick bookkeeping" which, he said, could not operate in the state of New York.

Work's Claim Ridiculed

Near the end of his address, Governor Smith seized upon a report made by Chairman Work of the republican national committee while he was secretary of the interior in which he was quoted as having said the government was trying to feed Indian children at the rate of nine cents a day per child and a statement once made by Secretary of War Davis calling attention to housing facilities for the American soldier, amounting to almost a "national disgrace."

"This, he said, was a fair example of what the republican party had done in the way of reducing the cost of government. He then directed a question to Mr. Hoover.

"Does he approve of a national economy that starves out the Indian children and neglects to provide proper housing, sleeping and eating facilities for the country's very first line of defense?"

"Does he see these pictures in their true light?"

"If he does not," he declared, "then I am prepared to say he does not understand the operation of government."

War and Peace Expenses

Governor Smith charged Mr. Hoover with making a "misleading statement" when he said in his acceptance speech that "by a vigorous economy federal expenses have been reduced by two billion dollars per annum."

"He knows just as well as I do and just as well as you do," the democratic nominee asserted, "that the difference between the 1921 expenditures and the 1927 expenditures of government is the difference between the cost of operating government in time of war and in time of peace."

Real and substantial economy, the governor declared in conclusion, lay in his address, which was punctuated by yells of "fight 'em AL," "pour it on 'em AL," could be brought by a reorganization of the old broken down structure of the federal government, by the abolishment of useless boards and commissions that overlap and duplicate efforts.

Borah in Carolinas

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Oct. 17.—Senator William E. Borah of Idaho will make his second and final appeal here tonight to the voters of normal democratic North Carolina to support Herbert Hoover's presidential candidacy in an address which will be broadcast over the nation by a coast-to-coast radio hookup.

The Idaho senator is expounding Hooverism, he told newspapermen today, and not republicanism on his campaign trip to southern states recently visited by Governor Smith.

"I am working only for Hoover's election," he declared. "I am particularly interested in the individual, and if he were not the nominee, I would not be here."

Whyler Is Told

At Salisbury, N. C., 40 miles northeast of here, where he motored last night from Charlotte to deliver an address, Senator Borah cited his reasons for his advocacy of Hoover. He declared that the republican nominee, by experience and fitness was qualified to solve the economic problems of the nation if selected to be the chief executive.

"These economic problems, including farm relief, have got to be solved," he said, "or they may endanger the structure of the American nation. I know of no one who is better fitted to solve them."

Hoover was characterized by the senator as "one of the marvels of the century in his ability to deal with economic problems." He reviewed the career of the republican nominee as head of the relief work in Belgium and central Europe, declaring that Hoover administered those tasks without any waste of funds, using "only

one-half of one per cent of the contributions for the operation of his relief machinery."

Proof of Honesty

"There is one way to test the honesty of Hoover," said the senator, "and that is the fact that he spent millions upon millions of dollars of the people's money in his relief work and not one cent has been misappropriated or misused." France, he added, did not audit Hoover's accounts submitted to her government for the Belgian relief work.

Prohibition, with another attack upon Governor Smith for his stand on the question, formed a major theme of the senator's address. He declared the women should see to it that prohibition is retained on the nation's statute books, adding that the amendment "has only been given a short test and it takes years often to achieve complete success in such great reforms."

The Idahoan also discussed farm relief, saying that Hoover was opposed to the equalization fee because it "charged back to the farmers the cost of marketing their products." He declared the republican nominee believed cheaper transportation, a federal farm board to handle the surplus crops and higher agricultural tariff rates would solve the farmers' troubles.

Mrs. Thompson Welcomes

STATE COLLEGE, N. M., Oct. 17.—Declaring that Gov. Alfred E. Smith is "the tall, if not the teeth and claws of the Tammany tiger," Mrs. Alexander Thompson of Portland, Oregon, a democrat opposing the candidacy of Gov. Smith brought her speaking tour of New Mexico to a close here last night.

Mrs. Thompson charged that Gov. Smith was "nominated by a well oiled machine, which rode over the minority at Houston" and declared that Smith is a "product of Tammany which organization has been an outrage to democratic principles."

She charged that "Smith was trained by Tammany and has been obeying Tammany for more than 30 years."

Mrs. Thompson concluded her talk with a eulogy of Herbert Hoover, saying that "Hoover has our nation offered a man more fitted for the presidency."

U. S. LAND OFFICE TO GET MEDFORD HOMESTEAD CASE

MEDFORD, Oct. 17.—A homestead contest case, in which Chas. Warren contested the right of Charles Dole to homestead 80 acres of land in the Foothills Creek section, was heard yesterday afternoon before United States Commissioner Chauncey Florey, who has turned the matter over to the federal land office at Roseburg.

Dole has completed his three years time on the place and is ready to prove up on the property, but is handicapped by the contention of Warren that a portion of the land is worth more as mining property than as farming land. Dole had six witnesses testifying in his behalf and Warren had four. Warren is after the possession of 20 acres of the land and has any waste of funds, using "only

CHAMPIONSHIP DRUM CORPS GIVEN BIG RECEPTION HERE

The Capital Post Drum Corps of Salem, winner of second place in the contest at the national convention in San Antonio, Texas, passed through this city yesterday afternoon and were given a big reception by Roseburg people. The drum corps paraded on the depot platform and gave a most interesting exhibition during the short time that the special train was in the city. Lloyd "Mutt" Williamson, drum major of the Medford drum corps, who assisted Salem in the national competition, was in command of the organization in "its concert. The train also was occupied by Portland Post drum corps which took first place in the 40-ct competition. The veterans were delighted with the reception at Roseburg, which they said was the biggest at any place along the line, and they were very grateful for the courtesies shown them.

SQUATTERS BACK AFTER RELEASE PORTLAND JAIL

H. C. Best and Emroy Davis, Fish Creek desert squatters, whose attempts to establish homes in the reserved lands have attracted a great deal of attention, returned to Roseburg today after having been released from the Portland district where they had been confined following their conviction on a charge of contempt of court. Considerable sentiment has been aroused over the efforts of the two men to obtain homestead rights on the land, and W. C. Culbertson, a candidate for congress from the Portland district, is making a campaign issue of the matter. Attorney Albert Abraham of this city is also appearing as counsel for the squatters.

SOUTH POLE DISCOVERY WILL BE CELEBRATED

OSLO, Norway, Oct. 17.—The anniversary of the discovery of the South Pole by Roald Amundsen in 1911 will be celebrated on December 14 by the Norwegian government as a memorial day for the famous explorer who died in an effort to bring relief to the lost expedition of General Nobile.

Beside the extensive observation in Norway Norwegians all over the world will be informed of their government's decision to enable them to arrange other commemorations.
