Hoover's Declaration

If elected mayor I will try to the best of my ability, with the cooperation of the city council, to enforce the city laws, and that without favoritism; keep a strict watch on the expenditures of the city, and oppose at all times gross extravagance in the handling of city funds. Will try in some conceivable way to liquidate the floating and bonded indebtedness, which is now nearly \$100,000; \$20,000 outstanding warrants are floating, \$60,000 bonded. This is not included in the item of street and sewer debt, which goes up into the hundreds of thousands of dollars, under the Bancroft bonding system. I am in favor of civic beautification. If elected I will see to it that the city is beautified, and will appoint a standing committee of representative citizens to look after the matter under my personal supervision. Last, but not least, I will continue to bring about the completion of the North Umqua highway by the way of Diamond lake and east to Salt Lake City from Coos Bay. Why, citizens, let our neighbors take away from us what is justly ours? The highway from Coos Bay to Salt Lake City is a possibility.

I have a solution to the garbage and dumping grounds which I am certain will give relief to all concerned, and will solve the question of many years, and satisfactory to the citizens of Roseburg.

ANNUAL INSPECTION HELD LAST EVENING

Annual inspection of Canton Robertson No. 13, I. O. O. F. and Auxiliary Robertson No. 13, was held last evening at the I. O. O. F. hall, together with the annual of the department commanders. ACCIDENT VICTIM DIES AT HOSPITAL

Chris Johnson, who was injured last Sunday evening, when his car left the highway north of Oakland, passed away early this morning in Mercy hospital at the age of 60 years.

He was born in Denmark on June 21, 1868, and came to this country in 1892. On April 20, 1894, he was married to Miss Lona K. Nelson. Mr. Johnson is survived by his wife, three daughters and one son: Mrs. S. H. Shorbach, Hibbs, Minn.; Mrs. Fabian Room and Miss Helen Johnson, both in the Philippine Islands, and Kristian Johnson, Portland.

Mr. Johnson at the time of his death was dairy instructor in the creamery department of the Northwest Co-operative Creamery association. He was also a member of the Masonic Order in Salt Lake City, Utah, from which place he came to Portland about three and one-half years ago. The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral Home, where preparations are being made to forward it to Portland on train No. 14 tonight.

AGED TYEE MAN BELIEVED BURNED NEIGHBOR'S BARN

Oliver Huff, 84-year-old resident of Tyee, was committed to the insane asylum today, following an investigation into the burning of a barn belonging to O. F. Williams, last Friday. Sheriff Webb, assisted by deputy state fire marshals, Malhorn and Warren, have been investigating the burning of the barn, and uncovered evidence which caused them to bring the aged man to this city. Upon being questioned by a board of examiners he is reported to have admitted in a general way the crime, which he claimed was in retaliation for the taking of his life. The examining board also believes that he is responsible for several forest fires in that vicinity. Because of his alleged pyromaniacal tendencies it was thought best to have him placed in the asylum for observation.
