SEPT. TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS KILL 26 IN OREGON

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 19.—Traffic accidents in September caused the death of 26 persons in Oregon and injuries to 551 persons, says a report by T. A. Rafferty, chief state traffic inspector. Traffic officers arrested 555 drivers and fines imposed totaled \$3669. Delinquent fees collected totaled \$3751.68 and stolen cars recovered had a resale value of \$6600.

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TELEGRAM METHOD OF STOCK SELLING BRINGS WARNING

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 19.—What is known as the "telegram method" is being used by unscrupulous salesmen to sell worthless stock. In Oregon, State Corporation Commissioner Mark D. McCallister said today. The salesmen, who are unqualified to sell stock in Oregon, make his sale to the purchasers, then has the buyer sign a telegram, personally sending his order to the company.

"Many persons could be saved their money and greater cooperation would be given the state in its effort to suppress the sale of worthless securities," McCallister said. "If people would investigate before buying rather than wait to report the matter after they make the purchase and find they have been defrauded, and the salesman has departed beyond the pale of jurisdiction."

The corporation department has information regarding some Washington brokerage companies that are attempting to operate by this method in Oregon.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 19.—Indications today were that Oregon yellow daisies would fetch higher prices on local wholesale lots of top quality stuff from producing districts, saying that growers were asking \$200 and sacks and twine, 7 c. b. shipping point. On that basis, onions laid down here would cost dealers upwards of \$3.25 per hundredweight. Quotations on U. S. No. 1 daisies this morning were around \$3.50 per sack with occasional lots of top quality stuff bringing a shade more. Yakima

ATHEIST ARRESTED IN ARKANSAS STARTS FAST

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 19.—Charles Smith, president of the American association for the advancement of atheism, who is serving out a \$25 fine in the city jail here, entered upon his second day of a self-imposed fast today as a protest against Arkansas laws forbidding an atheist the right to testify in court trials or to hold state office.

Smith, who was arrested Tuesday after he had opened atheist headquarters here, refused to pay the fine imposed in municipal court for distribution of atheistic literature. He said he would serve out the fine in jail as a protest against "the manifest injustice of refusing an American citizen the right to testify in his own defense."

Smith opened headquarters here to fight for defeat of an act forbidding teaching of theory of evolution in tax supported schools which will be voted on in the general election.

ANTI-HOOVER P. O. MEN ARE ORDERED SUSPENDED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The postmaster and assistant postmaster at Lansford, Pa., were ordered suspended today by Postmaster General New pending investigation of whether the postal regulations had been violated in the circulation of campaign material against Herbert Hoover.
