PARK LAUNCHED WHERE 107,000 FELL IN STRIFE

Bloodiest Fights of Civil
War Commemorated at
Fredericksburg.

COOLIDGE IS ORATOR

Millions of Dollars Will
Be Spent to Carry Out
Plans to Beautify
Battlefields.

FREDERICKSBURG, Va., Oct. 19.—President Coolidge formally set in motion forces to preserve one of America's greatest battlefields at Fredericksburg today.

He was the principal speaker at ceremonies breaking ground for the National Battlefields Memorial, which will include the Civil War battlefields of the Wilderness, Spotsylvania and Chancellorsville, where one-third as many men fell

as were lost by American forces in the World War.

The physical surroundings and historic structures that figured in the struggles of Americans against the British and resulted in the death or wounding of 107,000 men are little changed.

Bloody Clash Recalled
Hanover street looks the same. Down the gentle declivity of its dirt surface and across the surrounding countryside, seven federal divisions charged fruitlessly, seeking to wrest from the Confederates control of Marye's Heights, which commanded the section.

Seven times, 8,000 troops, each composing a division, flung themselves at the entrenched heights only to break in a maimed and bloody wave 10 feet from a wall at the foot of the Heights. The old wall is there today.

The passing years have left little mark on a white, frame house, over which great trees lean protectively. It sits on a quiet road not far from the Sunken Road, which diverges into the territory at the foot of Marye's Heights. That was where Martha Stevens lived and where she ministered to the hurt and dying on both sides.

To Cost Millions
After years of agitation, the last congress authorized rehabilitation of the battlefields. The bill was introduced and passed by Rep. S. O. Bland of Virginia. Five hundred thousand dollars was authorized, but indications are that the project eventually will cost millions.

The development will include five battlefields under the name of "The Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania County Battle Fields Memorial," grouped, roughly, in a half circle with a half radius of 12 miles, its center at Fredericksburg. Throughout the park will be traversed by a system of roads, some of which will be 100 feet wide.

Great portions of the original entrenchments and battlefields exist today and they will be rebuilt. Every effort will be made to rebuild the countryside's appearance as it was during the battle days.

Rich in History
There are few places richer in interest of the days when a united nation was born out of strife. Here is the spot where Jackson was mortally wounded; the chancellor house at Chancellorsville, the center of Hooker's doomed line; Salem Church, where 4,000 Confederates held 30,000 of Sedgewick's Corps; Spotsylvania, where Lee held out against Grant, and where, in the bloody battle, 11,000 men fell on two acres of ground.

Twenty-nine thousand dead and wounded were left in the dimly shambles of the Wilderness, hushed today with a seeming brooding relief. Across the countryside, in the woods, on the plains and the hills, thousands upon thousands of men and boys fell in unmarked graves, believing their cause the just one.

There will be written beneath an arch above the road that leads into the battle fields this inscription:

"Pause: Here Thousands Died For An Ideal."

S. P. WRECK FREES STEERS, INJURES TEN RACE HORSES

OAKLAND, Cal., Oct. 18.—Two carloads of wild Mexican steers were liberated and ten race horses enroute to Tanforan were injured in a spectacular train wreck in Niles canyon, 30 miles from here today.

Three cars of a west bound Southern Pacific freight train left the rails and piled up in a mass of wreckage that interrupted Oakland-Livermore commutation service and tied up numerous freight trains. The wreck occurred, it was believed when a dragging brake on a car loaded with sugar beets got under a wheel. The car was thrown off the rails, dragged sideways, and turned over twice.

The cars loaded with steers were directly behind the best car. Nine of the animals were killed. The others, crazed by fear, broke out of the wreckage and ran wild over the hills.

The car bearing the ten race horses, with trainer H. H. Doherty in charge, piled into the wrecked cars but stayed on the rails. Several animals were injured. Doherty said that the highly strung animals were a terror-stricken that they will be useless for the racing season. They were sent from the James, Peterson and Cordell stables at Boise, Idaho.

APPLE FARMERS OF OREGON DENIED LOANS BY BANKS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 18.—Practically ninety per cent of all apple orchards in the vicinity of Milton-Freewater, Oregon, are mortgaged, Bruce Shangle, manager of the Farmers' Brokerage company of Milton-Freewater, testified today at the interstate commerce commission fruit rate hearing here. According to Mr. Shangle a general depression has fallen upon the apple growers of eastern Oregon at a time when their orchards are producing an abundance of fruit of the highest quality. His firm, he stated, has taken over the fruit farms of 59 farmers in the past five years.

Bankers, he continued, are now compelled to refuse the apple farmers loans. Prior to 1925 orchard land had a loan value of from \$250 to \$500. At the present time a loan on an apple tract is not considered a safe investment by the majority of the banks.

That the depression is general in all apple growing sections of the state was shown in statistics submitted in I. C. C. document No. 219. Bank deposits in Hood River have fallen from \$2,234,516 for the second six months of 1919, to \$1,956,147 for a similar period in 1927. Statistics furnished by the Butler Banking company of Hood River showed deposits of \$2,240,056.56 in 1918 and 1919. These have fallen to \$1,978,854.44 for the same period in 1927 and 1928.
