Velvet Finds New Uses In the Winter's Mode

Patou Favors the Artificial Product Because It Is Thin Enough for Pleating; He Develops New Material

PARIS, Oct. 20.—Although velvet has always been the most favored fabric for winter wear, it is this year enjoying a greater vogue than ever before. The variety of uses to which velvet is now adapted explains its popularity.

In treating with velvet it is interesting to note that despite the remarkable progress achieved in this material, no new form of texture has been achieved. Any complete collection of fabrics will cover the entire field of velvets.

I have tried to establish no preference for solid colored velvets dyed by a new process. By working with the manufacturers I have obtained velvets with an up-standing pile which has given women new colorings difficult to imitate and new to fashion.

Cost Was Prohibitive

A few years ago this velvet was laid aside because of its exorbitant cost, but is now being used again for trimmings of ordinary winter suits. It is a fabric made entirely by hand and cannot be used freely because of the limited production.

There was a strong feeling a few years ago against artificial velvets, but the manufacturer has so improved in his art that a good customer need no longer hesitate to use it. As a matter of fact, I believe the day is near when artificial silk velvets will replace the natural velvet, one of the great advantages of artificial velvet is that with this fabric one can obtain a more extensive variety of design and coloring.

Thinner Than Genuine

Another advantage is that it can be made sufficiently thin to be pleated, which is something that could never be achieved with the genuine velvet. This field of pleated velvet offers the couturier many possibilities in decoration and originality in line.

The design most favored for the winter season is not exactly new as far as design goes, but it is new in the application of velvet. This is the light polka-dot on a dark background, usually in plaques, yellow, green or blue.

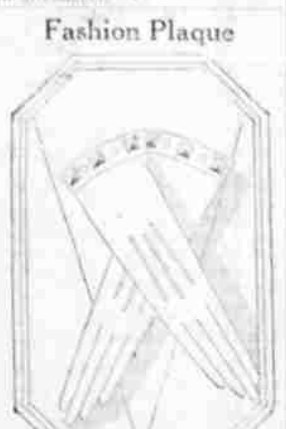
