JAILED ATHEIST STARTS 3RD DAY HUNGER STRIKE

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 20.—Charles Smith, president of the American Association for Advancement of Atheism, started on his third day hunger strike in the city jail here today in protest against the state's law prohibiting atheists from testifying in court.

Smith went to jail Wednesday rather than pay a fine of \$25 and costs on conviction of violating the law in connection with his activities against a referendum on a proposed law to prohibit teaching the theory of evolution in state supported schools, which is to be voted on November 6.

STUDENTS, DENIED VOTE, TEAR DOWN PARTY BANNERS

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 20.—As a protest against being barred from voting in the coming national elections, 1,500 undergraduates of Princeton university last night paraded through downtown streets and tore down two political banners, one a Smith and one a Hoover emblem.

Police charged the crowd, attempting to arrest those who tore down the banners, but were prevented by other students from taking anyone into custody.

When the students recently were denied the right to register on the ground that they were not residents of the city, a boycott was threatened but merchants' report this has not been put into effect.

The parade was the first mass action of the students in protest against the ruling.

MRS. MacDONALD ALONE IN BELIEF HUSBAND ALIVE

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The London papers this afternoon had practically dropped reference to the fate of Lieutenant Commander H. C. MacDonald, who disappeared in a flight from Newfoundland, carrying little, but brief paragraphs stating that there has been no news of him.
