Cold snapshins in the weather seemed to have a deadening effect on trading on wholesale produce markets here this morning. Green-stuffs moved in only nominal amounts at prices steady with last week's close. Potatoes met with better demand but there were no perceptible changes in values.

Demand for top quality eggs was active this morning and shippers were eagerly overbidding the market to obtain eggs which would meet the grade requirements of New York extras. Prices to producers for this grade ranged downward from 50c to 47c per dozen. Other grades of eggs and all kinds of butter were steady and unchanged. Best quality butter was in fair demand but lower grades were drags.

Country dressed meats and poultry showed no price changes in the early trading today.

Fears of all varieties were in abundant supply and met with fair demand at prices ranging from \$1.50 to \$2.75 per box. Extra fancy boxes, packed 120 to 150 in a box, brought the top prices.

Grapes came in for a fair amount of trading, supplies being of many varieties and mostly of desirable quality.

New crop nuts of several varieties were also favored a bit in trading today. Oregon and California walnuts moving perhaps a little better than others. Walnuts sold at 22c@34c per pound depending on size and grade. Large Oregon filberts brought 25c while medium sizes went at 23c. Japanese and Oregon chestnuts were in fair demand around 25c per pound while Brazil nuts sold mostly at 24c@24c and almonds at 25c@26c.

Cauliflower sold as well as anything else, offerings being of average good quality although little really 17. B. No. 1 stuff was to be had. Prices ranged from 75c to \$1.50 per crate depending on size and grade.

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
