EPISCOPALIANS TO BACK DRY LAW, RESOLUTION SAYS

(Associated Press Local Wire)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—The membership of the Episcopal church was called on today by its bishops in general convention here to set an example of law enforcement by respecting the prohibition and anti-traffic laws. The action was a reaffirmation of action taken by the 1925 convention.

A resolution seeking to put the Episcopal church officially on record in favor of the separation of church and state was tabled by the house of bishops.

The resolution, introduced by Bishop Thomas F. Gailor, of Tennessee, was criticized by Bishop Reese of southern Ohio on behalf of the committee on social service. Bishop Reese said he knew of no movement "looking to interference by the church in political or partisan matters."

The bishops approved a resolution urging on all institutions of learning the "importance of emphasis on the peaceful means open to the settlement of international disputes."

This proposal was a substitute for a resolution presented by the Right Rev. Edward L. Parsons, bishop of California, asking that the church look with disfavor on compulsory military training in schools, which was given a favorable committee report.

Bishop Frank W. Sterrett, coadjutor of Bethlehem, Pa., and Reese spoke in favor of the original resolution which was opposed by Bishops Harry S. Longley, coadjutor of Iowa, author of the substitute, and James Wise of Kansas.

The annual Douglas County Teachers' Institute continued today with a fine attendance. Hamilton, circuit judge, was a speaker, using the subject "An Exemplary Citizen." Another address, "Glimpses of Japanese Life," by Molly L. Paul, of South Deer Creek, was also a feature on the afternoon program.

The coaches of the several high schools met this morning for a brief session, and are to hold another meeting this evening to elect officers and complete their plans for the coming season.

The convention comes to an end this afternoon and the teachers will return at once to their schools. The Roseburg schools will open again tomorrow morning.

RED CROSS ROLL CALL TO START IN NEAR FUTURE

A meeting of Red Cross workers was held last night at the office of Dr. B. R. Shoemaker and arrangements were made for starting the annual roll call of that organization. This is the 12th annual roll call, and will be conducted between Armistice and Thanksgiving day with an effort to enroll five million members. Dr. B. R. Shoemaker, the local chairman, states that there will be 50 local workers assisting in the enrollment here, the work being directed by Mrs. E. A. Post, who has been appointed roll call chairman.

Stressing the fact that only during the roll call held once a year, does the organization seek support through membership for its local, national and international work, Dr. Shoemaker said the campaign plans will include the extension of a direct invitation to every resident to join. This will be done by reaching them at their places of business or at their homes.

"The American Red Cross," he said, "merits the support of everyone. The services it is rendering in this community, in the nation, and internationally, are indispensable and must continue. They can do so only with adequate response to the roll call."

"It is the only agency organized and equipped to cope with disasters in this and other communities. It answers the call for help from the smallest towns and the challenge of such overwhelming national calamities as the Mississippi valley flood of last year and the West Indies hurricane of this year. In the last three years it has collected and disbursed for the relief of sufferers from fires, floods, hurricanes and other disasters more than \$20,000,000."
