SEARCHING PLANE CRASHES, KILLING FOUR OCCUPANTS

(Associated Press Local Wire)

TUCSON, Ariz., Oct. 23.—Four men were killed today in the crash of an airplane sent out above the rugged hills of the Grand Canyon near here in search of a missing boy.

The men died either in the fall of the plane on the northern slope of Santa Catalina mountain or in the flames that immediately enveloped the wreckage.

The dead are: George Peck, of Tucson, pilot of the plane; Clifford Nelson, county deputy sheriff; Harold Whitman of Tucson, a passenger, and an unidentified young man believed to have been a friend of Peck.

The charred wreckage of the plane was found by Sheriff Jim McDonald and a party of deputies who took to the hills on horseback when reports were received that the plane was seen to fall. All four bodies burned almost beyond recognition, were found in the cabin.

The plane, a monoplane, was one of 15 planes sent to search for William Hyatt, 18, a newspaper carrier, who disappeared Sunday.

A group of county judges and commissioners representing land grant counties of Oregon, met here last night to discuss several matters relating to the O. and C. refund money which was claimed by the state, whose case was recently lost in the U. S. supreme court. Each of the counties has been holding the money unappropriated until the outcome of the state's suit was learned, and the matter of distribution now results in several problems being raised. C. S. GOODWIN, OF OVERBECK-COOKE, PLEADS GUILTY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 23.—Charles S. Goodwin, vice-president of the new defunct local brokerage house of Overbeck & Cooke, today entered a plea of guilty to a grand jury indictment charging embezzlement of funds belonging to customers.

Passing of sentence was postponed until after the trial of James P. Cooke, president of the firm, who will stand trial on a similar indictment.

The Overbeck & Cooke officials were arrested several months ago following the closing of the firm's doors last January 31 when it was revealed that more than \$1,600, one of customers' funds were missing.

The third official who was arrested, and who has been indicted, is Harold S. Philpott, secretary of the firm. Goodwin's plea of guilty came as a surprise to those who have followed the case, and it was said, to the other indicted officers.

Tom Handley, attorney for Goodwin, told the court that "It has never been the purpose of Goodwin to withhold any of the facts in the Overbeck & Cooke case. His desire is to give all the information possible. John Logan (of Goodwin counsel) and myself are agreed on the course Mr. Goodwin is taking. His plea permits him to appear as a witness in the cases of the other two men."

NEW LOGGING COMPANY TO BE ORGANIZED IN COOS

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Oct. 23.—Carl Davis, head of the timber department, and Fred Powers, head of the logging department of the Coos Bay Lumber company, together with A. H. Powers, veteran Coos county logger, formerly associated with the company, announced today that they will dispose of stock in that firm and reorganize to form an independent logging company to be known as the Powers-Davis Logging company with headquarters in Marshfield.

The three men have been associated with the Coos Bay Lumber company for about twenty years. The new firm will absorb the Southfork Logging company which has been operating near Powers for six months, and which employs about 35 men.

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 24.—Hans Steinke won over Pat McGill last night in a foul in a long drawn out wrestling match which ended when McGill threw Steinke over the ropes.

Each man had won a fall previously but the referee awarded the match to Steinke. Even though he lost the match, McGill, when he pinned Steinke's bulky shoulders to the mat for the one fall, accomplished what no other wrestler in America has been able to do. It was the first fall Steinke had lost since coming to this country five years ago. McGill won his fall with a double wrist lock and head scissors in one hour and one minute while Steinke took the first fall in 23 minutes.

FARMER SUICIDES ON EVE OF TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

OSBORNE, Kas., Oct. 23.—While grave diggers were disinterring the bodies of the family he was alleged to have murdered, prepared to begin here tomorrow, Fred Kaser, farmer, shot and killed himself at his farm home near Covert today.

Kaser was at liberty on \$60,000 bond, charged with killing his brother, Albert Kaser, the latter's wife and their six children, all burning their farm house the night of last May 31.
