NATION'S TOTAL REGISTRATION NEAR 43,000,000

American politics, is the great increase in the registration in the democratic "solid south." For the first time in years the southern states are in the throes of a spirited presidential campaign and reports from every state indicate voters will flock to the polls as never before.

Texas probably will qualify 1,500,000 voters, in the opinion of Governor Moody, although he believes only 800,000 will actually cast their ballots. The lone star state, in 1924, cast 657,509 presidential ballots.

Women Vote to Be Big
Old-time political observers have had their eyes opened at the remarkable registration of women voters. While only a few states make an official attempt to tabulate the potential voters as to sex, figures available are very unusual. Striking an average of the male and female registration, it is conservatively estimated that women will cast from 35 to 45 per cent of the total vote in the larger cities. In the rural districts this percentage probably will not be so high.

A few instances to indicate the increase of 72 per cent in the general trend: Maryland reveals women registrants over 1924. Philadelphia shows an increase of 116 per cent. St. Paul 72 per cent. Duluth 46 per cent. St. Louis 35 per cent and Kansas City 28 per cent.

Causes Assigned
Politicians of years of experience, while frankly expressing amazement at the registration figures for the 1928 election, talk confidently for public consumption of the benefits which will come to their candidate. But there is no doubt that privately there has been a big question mark hovering over the huge voters' lists for the managers of both parties.

Various schools of thought give various explanations for the sudden rush to the registration counters. One element says it's prohibition. Another says it's the religious issue. Another says it's prosperity. Still others maintain it is farm relief, water power, tariff, and a dozen other subjects which might affect various localities. And there are those who may contend that none of these are the issues—that the fight is one of personalities between Hoover and Smith.

Radio's Role Vital
But at any rate, it could be clearly seen that even before the conventions met and nominated the two major candidates that this was to be a campaign far different from any in past years. Smith and Hoover have been heard by nearly everybody, either in person or by radio, and this is believed by politicians to have given marked stimulus to the eligible voters who were qualified to register.

In addition women of both major parties have been driving hard with every argument to which women are susceptible to have them qualified. They have filled the whole nation with arguments for Hoover and for Smith and they have succeeded in drawing an unprecedented number of their sisters to the registration booths.

Then there are the first voters. There are first voters clubs everywhere, and even "Get out the first voters" clubs. Colleges and universities for young men and for young women are filled with Hoover and Smith clubs, and the campuses are filled with talk for and against the two candidates.

All in all, if this great outpouring of voters goes to the polls and if the contest is at all close, the determination of the winner may be delayed long enough to keep many on the anxious bench, even if the 15 per cent which as a rule refrains from voting remains at home.

DRIVE STARTS IN

CITY TUES. A. M.

Everyone Asked to Give to

United Charities Fund—

Budget is Outlined.

Tomorrow morning the drive for this year's community chest funds will begin. Everyone is asked to cooperate and be ready to be generous during the drive. The city has been divided into districts and will be thoroughly canvassed by collectors who, by the way, are business men and giving of their time to this worthy cause.

It has been pointed out by members

of the chest committee that these men would be helped greatly if every business man who employs help would meet with his employees the first thing tomorrow morning and list his employees' subscriptions to the chest. In this case he could hand them the collection along with his own subscription and save that solicitor a lot of time. In the past some employees have come direct to their employer with the subscription as an aid to the drive.

In consideration of the amount

of the budget and the population of the city, it is thought that a fair amount for employed men or women would be about one day's pay. This is paid in the neighborhood city of Marshfield with good results. Marshfield has about the same bustle and population as this city. The banks there average one hundred dollars each, department stores, one hundred dollars, grocery stores, thirty-five dollars, butcher shops from ten to fifty dollars.

This chest budget is considerably lower than several others in comparison of population. Eugene has a budget of \$48,000.00. This is seven times as much as that of this city and with only slightly more than three times the population.

By and all these organizations still prove very much worth while worthy to subscribe to. Realizing the heavy amount of individual drives for funds they are all willing to cooperate and work under the supervision and control of the community chest and thereby abide by the instruction of the chest.

One organization has elected to

remain outside of the chest control and financing plan. More money was requested than was thought advisable to spend by the community chest. The community chest demands results and unless obtained does not feel that it has a right to spend the money of the community in a reckless manner. Business men have come forward to express their satisfaction of the operation of the community chest during the past three years and are enthusiastic as to the success of the drive this year.

As a strictly business proposition

the Roseburg community chest asks your support. This is the fourth year that the community chest is entering upon its mission of service to those in want and distress. This one annual campaign for funds substitutes the constant stream of drives for charity and better results are obtained by the organized individual direction of the community chest.
