LOCAL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE IS NOW OUT DEBT

Secretary Reports Last of Publication Bills Have Been Paid.

OUTLOOK IS BRIGHTER

Advertising Fund in County Budget for Next Year Will Be New Project.

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is now completely out of debt and is working on a cash basis for the first time since 1925, according to the report made to the directors at last night's regular meeting. During the past three years the organization has been badly handicapped by a lack of funds occasioned through the heavy indebtedness incurred in 1925. The effort to pay off this indebtedness has required the use of funds badly needed for other purposes and has seriously interfered with the activities and operations of the chamber.

H. E. Cully, the present secretary, with the aid of the board of directors, has been working diligently to clean up all outstanding debts before the end of the year. It was felt that the organization should start the new year with a clean slate and in a manner that would prevent future handicaps of this nature. To do this the work has been somewhat curtailed recently, the office force reduced and a strict economical program adopted. As a result Mr. Cully was able to report last night that the old indebtedness had been wiped out, payment has been completed on new furniture and fixtures recently installed to handle the work of the A. A. and there is a small balance in the treasury. This gives a very encouraging outlook for the new year and the directors are well pleased with the prospects for the future.

The indebtedness resulted from heavy expenses incurred in issuing the last booklet, which was a very time piece of publicity literature. The booklet has attracted wide attention for the very thorough manner in which it deals with the resources and advantages of Douglas county, and it has been the means of bringing many new families into the county.

The Chamber of Commerce attempted to establish a booklet fund to pay the cost of the publication, but this fund failed to materialize, leaving the chamber to pay the bill, which amounted to about \$1,000. This coupled with other indebtedness gave the organization a heavy financial burden in view of the small budget that is provided each year for operating expenses. Consequently for the past three years money that has been needed for publicity purposes has had to go into the fund for retiring the unpaid bills.

Mr. Cully, since becoming secretary, has made it a strict point to require each outside activity of the Chamber of Commerce to be self-financing. The land products shows, maps, recreational folders, Shmoo gift boxes, and other such projects sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce have paid for themselves and in several cases have shown a small profit. At the recent banquet staged for the Portland Goodwill caravan, there was a profit of \$25 which was turned over to the Douglas County Chamber of Commerce to apply on the Strawberry Carnival deficit.

There is now a big demand for a new issue of the Chamber of Commerce booklet dealing with Douglas county. It is not the intention of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, however, to bear this expense again. The booklet is one that deals with every section of the county, showing the advantages of each place, and listing all of the towns and rural communities outlining the important resources of each. It is felt that such a booklet is of county-wide value and that the local Chamber of Commerce should not be required to pay the entire cost. Consequently an application will be made to the county budget board to include in this year's budget a county advertising fund, a portion of which can be used for the printing of the booklet. Douglas county is one of the few counties of the state that has failed to provide such a fund, and it is believed that this county, with its many great resources and attractions, should be able to advance its own cause equally with the other counties of the state.

And of the other Chambers of Commerce in the county will be solicited in presenting this proposition to the budget committee in an effort to secure a fund ample to enable the various publicity organizations in surplus applicants with suitable descriptive literature.

If such an advertising fund can be created it is believed that it will permit a greater activity on the part of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce as well as similar organizations in other towns of the county, which will doubtless result in the development of each section to a very material degree.

It is the plan of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce to extend its field of activity during the coming year, as there will be available

MOUNT ALTO RANGE TO BE SEED BY PLANE METHOD

Adams and Dillard, proprietors of the local airplane service, are arranging a seeding job for George McChesney, local stockman, at Mt. Alto ranch. The airplane with its special equipment will be used to seed several thousand acres of old burn to make the land ready for grazing. There have been several of these jobs completed in Coos county with exceptional success and at a great saving to the land owners. This is the first contract of the kind to be undertaken in Douglas county. Stockmen are watching these seeding jobs with great interest, as a great deal of useless land can be converted into good range at low expense. The work is to be done as soon as weather will permit. A number of stockmen are making preparations to be present when the seeding is done so that they may determine whether or not they can benefit their own range by the adoption of the method.

THREE CALIFORNIA TEAMS TO BATTLE FOR COAST TITLE

Next Saturday's Games Are Expected to Eliminate Two of Contenders in 1928 Race.

NEWLANDS (Associated Press Sports Writer) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 28.—The "triple entente" of western football has come to a parting of the ways and after a peaceful and joint rule of two weeks, Stanford, Southern California and California decide next Saturday which two or possibly which one will continue to dominate the affairs of the Pacific coast conference.

Tied for the title the Cards of Stanford and the Trojans of Southern California risk their gridiron chances in one grand sweep at Los Angeles, Calif., also undefeated, gambles with its future standing in a game at Berkeley against Oregon but the odds are not so heavy.

From east to west across the country no contest looms above the classic that will bring Stanford and Southern California into action. More than 75,000 persons have long since snapped up the tickets that assure a jammed coliseum. As many more could be sold if the stadium could accommodate the throng.

Last year these two eleven played to a 13-13 tie and ended the season tied with Idaho for the conference championship. This year one must drop behind unless, of course, they finish in another unexpected tie.
