Trojans Due For DEFEAT SATURDAY. EXPERTS ASSERT

Betting Odds on Stanford
for First Time in 3
Years: Bears and
Oregon Meet.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 29.—Favor for three years running over Stanford, Southern California has had the odds makers turned on them this season and it looks much like the Trojan football team will be the underdogs in next Saturday's all-important struggle with the Cardinals.

Odds at present favor "Pop" Warner's team by a margin of at least two to one. Odds of 10 to six are frequently quoted. Nearly everybody is spotting points, the touchdown or a couple. The mathematics inclined figure time up with the Cardinals figuring them paper favorites by from one to three touchdowns.

Southern California's followers believe that with the Trojans on the bottom, looking up, nothing could be better. They anticipate the change will have a psychological effect. Being underdogs will serve to key Coach Howard Jones' men up to a fighting pitch that would enable them to do no end of damage, they believe.

While fancies argued pro and con, Jones found his task made more difficult with the temporary loss of Captain Jesse Hibbs, star string center. Hibbs, suffering from a heavy cold, was expected back in the name today, but it was unlikely that Barrager, who has sustained a hip injury, would be in uniform before tomorrow, giving him but two days in which to get ready for the important game.

Officials of the University of Southern California announced today that 55,000 of the 75,000 available tickets to the coliseum clash here December 1 with Notre Dame have been spoken for. A capacity crowd of 75,000 is expected for the intercollegiate game.

Weather Outlook Bad
STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Oct. 29.—The Stanford football squad went through a strenuous workout in a heavy downpour yesterday and prepared for more of the same thing today, with the weather forecast predicting unsettled weather.

The reverses that form the backbone of the Cardinals' attack cannot be executed properly with a wet ball, and unless the weather clears up the atmosphere with which the Stanford backs execute their plays may be dulled.

New Star Has Heart
NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—A story of how the country's leading college football season passed up a chance to boost his own total on a team mate could make a touch down in field for his coach, Chick McLean, Ken Strong, New York University's great halfback, is the hero.

In the Coliseum game, said McLean, "just before we made our first touchdown we were penalized five yards for taking too long in a huddle. Do you know what was going on in that huddle?"

BETTER COURSE FOR FIRST TWO YEARS IN H. S.

ELGIN, Oct. 29.—(Special)—Students in high school should be allowed to spend the first two years on subjects of more immediate practical value than is now the case, Fred L. Stetson, professor of education, has recommended in an article dealing with the result of a study made of Oregon high school curricula.

Many high schools emphasize university or state requirements to such an extent that studies of more practical value are neglected, to the injury of those who do not finish high school or go on with a higher education, Professor Stetson says. Such subjects as algebra and foreign language should be left for the last two years of the high school course.

The often-voiced criticism that high schools are devoting too much time to "fancy" courses, is not enough to the "three R's," is not horns out by statistics, Professor Stetson points out. It has been determined that about 92 per cent of the student's time is consumed by the five fields of mathematics, English, social sciences, foreign languages and natural sciences. The 1924-25 study program of 11,339 students from 181 Oregon high schools were used in compiling this information. Clerical education was found to be the only vocational study which received as much time as the least favored of the others.

Professor Stetson believes that if the high school curricula in Oregon could be revised to allow more resources in vocational studies during the first two years the student would have a much easier task in selecting a field of work, and would be benefited more than by the traditional studies now in use.

SHOCKING TO PESTS
LONDON.—A new experimentally charged dust is claimed to be death to pests and a boon to crops. Experiments show that as the two blades of the plow pass through the soil, an electrical field is created, which kills insects and weeds and puts nitrogen into the soil.

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COUNTER CHARGES OF THEFT RESULT FROM CULT SPLIT

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 29.—Counter charges of theft have brought into court and public notice a hitherto little known philosophical cult, called the Aquarian Foundation, located on Vancouver Island, at Cedar-by-the-Sea, near Nanaimo. The cult is reported to have a membership of 2,000 Americans and Canadians. Strife in the colony became open warfare when Edward A. Wilson, president, and known to cult members as Brother XII, deserted his first flock and started another colony on Valdez Island, nearby. He then filed charges which resulted in the arrest of Robert England, secretary-treasurer, declaring he had embezzled \$2,800 from the colony. England, freed on bail, in turn had charges against Wilson which resulted in his arrest for the purported misappropriation of \$13,000 of the organization's funds.

The colony, which is said to have been founded by about a dozen wealthy Americans and Canadians for the betterment of mankind and the study of philosophy, while small in the fall, is reported to have grown greatly during the summer when the membership was increased by university students from California.

The new society, called "Mandeth," started by Wilson, was intended to be a school for occult training. The first rule was "mind your own business."

Ten conditions were laid down for the applicant about to enter Mandeth. He must be: "Broad minded, unconventional, unselfish, courageous against opinions, unafraid of others, not curious, free from garrulity, naturally silent, loyal to associates, not to be turned aside."

An article in the "Chalice," the magazine of the cult, written by Wilson, attacked marriage as an unnatural "system of men-made inequalities."

EXONERATION' OF VANZETTI DOESN'T IMPRESS GOVERNOR

(Associated Press Special Wire)

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—The Outlook, an independent weekly magazine, publishes what it contends is an exoneration of Bartolomeo Vanzetti from any part in the Bridge-water, Mass., holdup for which he was convicted prior to his conviction and execution, with Nicola Sacco for the holdup and murder of a South Braintree paymaster.

The importance of its investigation, according to the magazine's opinion, is that Vanzetti's conviction for the first holdup had an influence on the second trial. "The Bridge-water case was a foundation stone of the whole prosecution," it contends.

The Outlook offered to lay its information before Governor Fuller of Massachusetts. The governor's secretary made public a letter in Boston to Mr. Fuller in which he said that Mr. Fuller had read an advance copy of the article and was "not any more impressed with this confession than with the confession of Madeiros."

Celestina F. Madeiros confessed while awaiting execution in Charleston prison for another crime, that he and members of the Morelli gang committed the holdup and murder for which Sacco and Vanzetti were executed. Madeiros went to the chair the same night as Sacco and Vanzetti a year ago last August.
